ANNUAL REPORT

The Scholarship Committee of the Westminster Regiment Association

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to report on the activities of the above-named committee for the Association year, 1966-1967.

The membership of the committee has remained the same as it was when appointed three years ago this month. The exception, of necessity, is the replacement of Walter Hogg by Ron Rurley when the latter assumed the presidency. Walter is not lost, however; he seldom is, and when some emergency arises and a quorum is needed, we can count on Walter as a "trained and ready reserve." It is a pleasure to report that the members show no inclination to depart the committee, and they must be complimented on the fact that there have been no absentees at any meeting since our inception, except, ironically, at the most pleasurable of all the meetings - the Selection meeting of August 14, 1966, when D'Arcy and Elsie Baldwin entertained the members and their wives at the Circle Six Ranch.

The response to the 1966 call for applications was somewhat greater than earlier responses: fourteen persons asked for application forms and received them along with covering letters amplifying the information given on the form. From these requests eleven firm applications resulted-six from boys and five from girls.

The committee met August 14, 1966, at The Circle Six Ranch for the critical adjudication of applicants. Both the committee chairman and secretary were absent on distant holidays, but Pete Grossman and Walter Lyle, as chairman and secretary, respectively, had made good preparation to take their places. Very complete and informative summaries were made of each applicant's qualifications, so that each committee member had a comprehensive view of the whole problem. And it is a problem. The committee respects very carefully the wishes of the association in establishing this fine and much-needed scholarship. For one thing, it was not easy to gather the money necessary to fund this award; for another thing, 500 bucks ain't hay. But most of all, the members are intensely serious about judging fairly the fine young people that offer their qualifications for our examination and decision. The undersigned is grateful for the kind of attention his fellow members have given the job.

After a succession of secret ballots the 1966 winner emerged in the person of John Lindsay Sharp. John is the grandson of one who enlisted with the 131st Battalion and transferred to the 7th Battalion and was killed in action at Hill 70, August, 1917. John graduated from the Ladysmith High School. He received an average of 81.75% in the B.C. Scholarship Examinations. He is in residence at U.B.C., where he is embarked on a science program, with special interest in Chemistry and Physics.

The scholarship examination standing of one other applicant was higher, by very few points, than John Sharp's record, but the higher mark belonged to a candidate who had won a previous award of this association, and the committee exercised its right, as provided in the terms of its responsibilities, to make the award as it did. This action is the subject of a motion that this committee has made to the executive and that it is hoped this meeting will approve.

This scholarship, as our members have read in The Groundsheet, has been donated by members of the families of the men whose names are in the title. Sergeant Tupper McPhee and Private Stewart McPhee, 629615 and 629616, respectively, were members of 14 Platoon, D Coy, 47th Bn. Tupper McPhee was killed in action May 5, 1917; Stewart was badly wounded May 5, 1917 and invalided out, although he survived until 1951. Alf Eamer, CQMS C Coy, Westminsters, is well remembered by most of us here.

The donors have expressed the wish that this award be made to one of the applicants for our scholarship not necessarily our award winner. This means that two scholarships are available for our young people; the one application form will serve for both. Needless to say, our committee is pleased to have the responsibility of administering this award and have taken steps to advertise it in the appropriate places.

The appearance of the form is an improvement on the Mark 1 edition, and it incorporates minor improvements in the wording as well as advice that our scholarship will not be awarded to previous winners, except under exceptional circumstances. This advice does not conflict with the rules laid down for our operation. Moreover, it does not prevent a previous winner applying for another award. However, we think it wise to warn applicants of the possibility and avoid unnecessary disappointment. Discretion must be given the committee - at least the power to exercise it - for no two situations seem likely to be alike in dealing with people, and we cannot lay down very strict boundaries for our awards without providing future embarrassment for ourselves. I think our committee can exercise discretion for the good of the association, and I think the members would be un- successful charter flights to Europe from time to time.

However, in the narrow limits of the Association itself, a sufficient number of people who are interested enough in travel in a group to Europe at any SPECIFIC TIME cannot be found.

Other organizations, with less stringent qualifications are able to sponsor such charters because outsiders who want to travel cheaply to Europe simply join for the purpose. (For example: In 1963 my wife and I joined a Scottish group and last year we became Irish Protestants for the same purpose.)

This is not possible however with our Association with membership confined, as we wish it to be, to those who served with one of our units. But it is possible with the CLUB and this is why we have it.

At the present time membership in the Club stands at 36 families (about 80 people) who have the intention of going if possible.

So far no attempt has been made to bring in outside people for it is for Association members that the charter is being organized.

REPORT ON CADET ACTIVITIES - 1966

We have three cadet corps sponsored by The Regimental Association; one in New Westminster, one in Haney and one in Abbotsford.

The Cadet Corps in Newton which was previously affiliated with the Seaforths, is now affiliatd with The Royal Westminster Regiment.

At the last inspection held in May, 1966, the New Westminster Corps was first in the Vancouver area and fifth in B.C.

The Haney and Abbotsford Corps were much lower but they are doing good work.

The New Westminster Corps band consists of twenty-one bandsmen and a drum major. The latter is the son of Lt. John Usher, Quartermaster of the regiment, and grandson of Jack Usher, who served with the Westies overseas.

Number 2316, the Westminster Cadet Corps, has been selectd to provide a twenty-piece band for the cadet exchange to Expo 67.



Barney Jone's inept tournament secretary made a firm date for the wrong Saturday (May 20th). When he woke up he found May 27 — the real Melfa Day all booked up from 8 a.m. on.

We COULD play at Hazelmere, the scene of last year's struggle, between 7 and 8 o'clock on May 27th IF we booked our times individually. At this date Lower-Mainland courses have not been scouted for tournament time on May 27th, but we are unlikely to find anything but individual times anywhere.

Consider these points then:

* Wherever we go we should tee-off before 9 o'clock.

Last time some players found too little time between golf and dinner.

- * A golf time between 7 and 8 is not too terrible except for the people who have to travel an hour before teeing off. However, the players farthest away could be given the time nearest 8, or the latest time, whatever that will be.
- * Wherever we go we shall have to commit ourselves to a firm number of players, or, more likely, book individual names in foursomes.

Therefore — if YOU would like to play golf (or something like it) on the morning of May 27, with the rest of the boys, SEND YOUR NAME and AD-DRESS to the name and address below.

The first names in will get the latest times, unless "early" is requested and unless Chilliwack people or others from the outback displace them.

It would be best to send in the names of a foursome, but individual names, pairs, or trios will be registered and made into foursomes.

When a golf course is found and bookings are firm you and your foursomes will be notified of your starting time and provided with other necessary information. Obviously, there must be a closure date for registra-

ions; it is figured that April 15 is as late as we can leave booking times in any golf course, on a Saturday. So, APRIL 15 is it. If you are in doubt, send in your name anyway; a cancellation can be arranged moreeasily than an addition.
