Dear Mr Lyle,

Just to improve the communication with our friends all over the world, The Dutch Veterans Legion has appointed me starting this month to act as Foreign Secretary.

Reading the files, I saw your letters of November 1968 about the trip you made through our country, but I take it that you never have received a copy of our monthly "Oud Wapenbroeders" with the report about this visit. I am sending you the relative pages enclosed.

We hope that this will not have been your last trip, and that we can await a new visit within short. We shall always be glad to give you any assistance you should need.

During the coming months we are going to make contact with the big world outside of Holland now, because we should like to know how other veterans in other countries succeed in keeping together their members and what they do for them. Most of the dutch soldiers and ex-soldiers are and always have been civilians in uniform. It is typical Dutch. Therefore, most of the re- soldiers go. Dear Mr. de Graaff,

Thank you for the interesting letter and for the pages from your magazine with the very complete story of our visit to Holland in May 1968.

In return, I am sending you a few copies of our paper, "The Groundsheet" (Souvenir edition) of that trip and I have asked that your name be placed on the mailing list to receive future issues. This letter will be re-printed in the next issue in the form of an "open letter".

From first hand, those of us who were on our tour, know what an excellent, lively, organization the Netherlands Legion is and we are not at all surprised that it has conceived such an unique idea as this, of appointing a Foreign Secretary. It is more evidence of the thoroughness in organization, displayed to us at that time. Such an appointment would not be made lightly and it would only be given to one who could make a success of it, so we send sincere congratulations to you on the appointment and our best wishes in the task.

Insofar as this organization is concerned, it is not a national one but a regimental one and so the direction of our efforts is quite different from national organizations such as yours or such as our own Royal Canadian Legion and others. So when you ask what we "do" for our members you must bear that in mind.

We certainly do nothing in the way of assisting any members as individuals financially. Mainly, I think, it is our members who "do" things for others, but of course. most of the work devolves on a very few. This is true of almost any group and, like you, we also would wish that more would be active.

Our membership is located all across Canada and indeed we have some in England and one, at least, in Italy, as well as a good number in the United States.

Perhaps the one thing we do best for our members is the fact, that we have this paper, The Groundsheet, which is our line, life-line really, to keep all these people in touch. Whether or not our members always always exceeds the price of it, so perhaps this is where pay their dues (and these are very small indeed) we we do something for our members. continue to send the paper, until it is returned "address Now you might ask, how do we find ourselves able unknown" or the member has passed on to wherever old to make all these considerable and continuing expen-

sending dues is laziness or oversight. Eventually, most members get around to it in any case. The important thing is that, to have had service with our Regiment, is all that is required to be a member and for no reason whatsoever, do we wish to forget him (or her) and the Groundsheet is our one and only means of keeping us together.

Very early in our existence as an Association, we decided, that one very important duty for us must be regular visits to our hospitalized comrades. There can be no more worthwhile or necessary function of any veteran's group, than this.

Our members, I said, do things for others and one of these is a Scholarship Award. We have set aside a sufficient number of dollars to provide \$500 .- each year to further the higher education of a worthy student. This is a competition, open to descendents of anyone who served with the Regiment and attracts entries from all over Canada.

Then there is assistance we give the Regiment itself. You mention "civilians in uniform" as being typically Dutch, but it is no less true of us, for ours is a citizens' regiment. It is one with a long history (for this young country of Canada, at least) and a distinguished one. We, who have served in the Regiment, whether in World War I or II, are very jealous of the reputation we achieved during our service and we naturally want the good reputation to continue, so we try to help and encourage those, who still serve under the name of the Regiment. We do this by financial assistance, first to the Regiment's several Cadet Corps, of which we are extremely proud, because they have, over many years, shown themselves worthy of that pride. Also, we have assisted the Band, which is another source of pride, because it is recognized as one of the best military bands in Canada's Militia. Also, the Rifle Team, which has produced some of the finest marksmen in the country.

One of our latest projects is to help in forming a regimental museum, which we know will be of great interest, not only to our members but to the public who will be able to visit it.

For the members themselves, we have two main functions throughout the year. One is an annual dinner in which we celebrate, ostensibly, one of the greatest victories in battle of our Regiment in World War II, but which, in reality, is a celebration of all our service and all our battles since World War I. The occasion is called the Melfa Dinner; the Melfa being a river in Italy, across which we formed a bridge-head in May 1944 and in which one of our officers earned and received the Victoria Cross. This dinner is a focal point for us. Some of our members come from very far afield and as you know, when old soldiers get together, there is no need for other entertainment. Somehow the cost of this dinner

ditures? This leads us to our other annual function, which is called the annual Smoker, which incidentally, since everyone has stopped smoking (or should) should be renamed "Drinker", a name which will be more true for a number of years yet. This is the occasion, which is the culmination of a fund raising activity, entered into by members all across Canada for weeks before. If the Groudsheet can be called, as I said, the "life-line" of our Association, then the results of this activity can be called the "life-blood" of it. We have some very devoted members on our Executive Committee, devoted to the extraction of a dollar here and ten dollars there and they are the organizers of this activity, but it is the members themselves who make it a success through their support of it.

These then are the things we do on a continuing basis. There are other projects, such as publishing a history of the Regiment and our "sentimental journey" in 1968, which could be added to our effort.

I hope there is some help for you in the foregoing accout. It may be, however, that the Royal Canadian Legion could be a better source of help to you (and you to them) because you are so similar and I have taken the liberty of passing on a copy of your letter to one of our members, who happens to be the President of the New Westminster Branch of the Legion.

With you, I hope that the trip of 1968, is not to be our last. Your letter may be the encouragement we require to get moving on a new "sentimental journey". Yours' sincerely,
