

GROUNDSHEET

The Regiment is in the midst of a very active and successful training year. Recruiting has been good and the present establishment has been almost filled.

Captain Gerry Potter's B Coy, which is undertaking all recruit training up to pay level C, has been very busy with the influx of new blood. A Coy commanded by Major Chuck Marshall has been training all year to prepare themselves for their commitment this summer to Forces Mobile Command. This parade is to be held in Clearbrook. This will be the third Freedom that The Regiment has received, the others being New Westminster and Mission.

During the first week of July the Forces Mobile Command will be conducting their exercise at CFB Wainwright and the Regiment will be contributing a full Coy.

This is our second year as a member unit of FMC and have found that it has added a great deal of incentive to the recruits to complete their basic and trades training as quickly as possible in order to participate in it.
