Since the events of September 11th, the world would seem to have changed... or has it? Is there, in fact, more danger in the world or have we merely been reminded that it was there all the time? Clearly, security both at home and abroad is now being addressed and we must be diligent in our efforts to protect the peace, which has been so dearly purchased by those who have served.

Now the good news! The Regiment continues to grow and is the largest reserve unit on the British Columbia mainland. We parade approximately one hundred and ten soldiers on Thursday nights and deploy around seventy soldiers on a weekend exercises. We are concurrently training in patrolling, running a machine gun course, and teaching newly sworn in Abbotsford students Basic Recruit Training.

Last year, while most Brigade units saw growth in their units of about 7%, the

Westies grew an impressive 17.5%! With our recruiting section "firing on all cylinders", we expect similar growth this year. Special thanks to Capt Chuck MacKinnon for another successful year in recruiting!

The emphasis, this year, will be Hopefully. Reconnaissance Patrols. culminating in a Patrol Competition. The graduates of the basic Infantryman's Course this past summer, are attending the "SQ" course. This is a secondary qualification course for all Basic Infantrymen. The course covers all the Support Weapons, such as the C6 Medium Machine Gun, 60mm Light Mortar & the SRAAW (M) - Carl Gustav 84mm Anti - Armour weapon. Also in January, some of the Company will be Basic Machine Gunner's attending the Course. This course concentrates on the LMG & MMG (C-9 Light Machine Gun - 5.56mm & the C-6 Fabrique Nationale General Purpose Machine Gun -7.62mm). The HMG .50 Calibre is not taught because all of these resources are tasked overseas. A portion of the Company is also undergoing training and selection for the CRIC - Composite Reserve

From the Post (cont)

The Way I Remember It.. K47614 Bill Armour

Best wishes to all our Amicos. .. With a special hi to Fred West.

This is an account of the activities that took place April/44 on the West Cassino front..... I believe it was also around Valvori, Italy, the name of which I learned from your article "A trip up the mountain" (ED. Feb., 1999 Groundsheet) The monastery could be seen across a space @ the same altitude as Valvori. I appreciated what a hot spot it was having experienced short times there. What a tough climb to get there. Sid Burton and I had the job of laying cable from an old stone mill on the river between "A" Coy and International Post up over the mountain to wherever Patrol Master Ketcheson was operating. We worked as linemen, no wireless Truck or motorcycles, only mules and Shanks pony. We left Battalion Tactical HQ @ last light one night, joined up with Mule and Reinforcement supply train led by Ross Douglas, headed up the rough mountain trail, arriving @ "A" Coy Signals Exchange late evening. Visited with Jack Pitcairn, Bill Thorenson and others, some sleep and off @ first light, loaded down with Signals equipment, travelled up the river to Old Stone mill. Started and spent all day laying cable, and no surprise, ran out of cable. Had to cannibalize on existing old wire. Mistakenly cut off a machine gun nest on the

mountain, restored same quickly. The Italian Marines were always helpful and good natured as I seen them. Sid and I were relieved that night on the mountain by a fellow signaller, Stienbact, when spent a cool night on the mountain, being in a dangerous spot in darkness. We spent an anxious night @ the mill awaiting a signal of completion of our cable laying,...The remainder of time in that position was to maintain the signals line between "A" Coy, the Old Mill and over the mountain we had just laid cable. We also took on the job of escort guard & guide bringing in our mule supplies and reinforcements each night from the junction of "A" Coy trail and our trail along the river. Each night @ last light a party of three of us, that is Sid Burton, and Italian marine named Joesph and myself would mose over to the junction and wait there for the sound of the mule train headed for "A" Coy. We'd peel off our supply mule and reinforcements and get them back to the mill, then return the mule party back to the junction. The wait could be a couple of hours and with Joesph having his ration of Grappa with him and being a sharing fellow, made these waits less painful.... One night we missed the river crossing trail, had to stop on the trail, the reinforcements being dead tired went to sleep immediately. Sid retraced and found the crossing, while the rest of us waited. Sid then returned with several Italian marines. whom practically carried the lot across the river. Those follows were always cheery & obliging or so I found them. ... Another incident. We spent one morning and afternoon in the "A" Coy position. Our sigs line had a fault in it between the Old mild and "A" Cov
