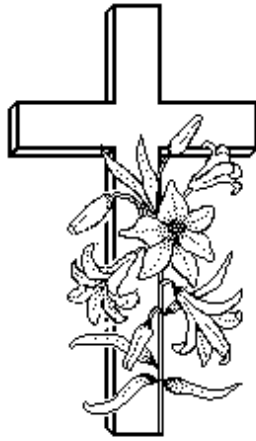

Badges!....We Don't Need No Stinking Badges!

Actually, we do. Badges, berets, ties, colours are all representations of our Regiment and Association. These are items that show what we belong to and part of our traditions, heritage, and beliefs. The Regiment has cap badges, unit shoulder flashes, collar dogs and regimental buttons for each individual to wear with pride in belonging to the Royal Westminster Regiment. Our Association has had the Bucky Beaver as the symbol used on our blazer crest. Well the Bucky Beaver has been the Association symbol before the Association began. It is now time to update the Bucky Beaver and add to our Association accoutrements.

The Bucky Beaver is the important symbol of the Association. It is distinct to the Association but incorporates the regimental cap badge to show our heritage. Like the Regiment the symbols should be updated to represent current times. With computers today changes can be made far easier and by less talented individuals. To update the Bucky Beaver a few changes were made. The changes were to change the king's crown on the cap badge to a Queen's crown, add ROYAL to the cap badge and Association scrolls, and to change the blue beret to a forest green beret with an updated cap badge. Consequently, the Bucky Beaver remains the principle symbol with some modest changes. The title Royal was bestowed on the Regiment in 1967 and has been on the cap badge since 1972. Royal has been used with the Association name as long as I have been a member and now is represented in our symbol. The Queen's crown now properly represents our sovereign. Given the longevity of the Queen's mother I expect we will not have to change this in the near future. So where does the beret come from, you may ask? A few years ago the Association executive struck an Accoutrements Committee to look into some new symbols. Since we have not had any blue berets for a long time and the red beret is worn by Military Police and Search and Rescue another distinct beret was sought. The selection chosen was based on having a beret that represents something about the Regiment from WWI and WWII. To this end a forest green beret with a maroon patch was selected. The forest green is from the 1st Canadian Division of WWI and the maroon is from the 5th Canadian Division of WWII. Thus the Regiments affiliation with these divisions is now represented in our Association headdress. Another item that the Accoutrements Committee approved was an Association Tie. Until now we have worn the standard Regimental tie. Most associations have distinct ties that have more visible characteristic symbols of their regiments. These take the form of exploding bombs for the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers or the antelope for the Royal Warwickshire Fusiliers. To that end the committee selected the cap badge as the symbol to be displayed on our association tie. The tie is royal blue with cap badges of old Dutch gold with a touch of pink. These colours our regimental colours represented in our regimental tie. Artwork of the blazer badge, cap badge, and the association tie are on the insert with this issue.

For those of you that have the older blazer badge, this does not mean you have to change immediately to the newer badge. Certainly, those veterans joined and severed with these symbols and no one should take that away. That badge and the original Bucky Beaver is part on the history of the Association and will remain so. Our Association history is held and cared for by the Regimental Museum.

How can we get these badges, beret, and tie? Presently, we are working on providing a supplier and should have this completed by the Melfa Weekend in May. As an initial estimate I have one quote in at:

Blazer Badge (Wire)..\$50.00, Cap Badge (Wire)..\$25.00, Association Tie (Woven)...\$50.00, Beret...\$35.00. The delivery, once we order is 5 to 6 weeks and will have a minimum order for the ties of 50. I am aiming at having samples and possibly some product for the Melfa Weekend. **Len Wohlgenh**, Accoutrements

Melfa River Memorial Project - Italy 2006

Plans to erect a memorial plaque honoring the Melfa River Crossing in Italy in 2005 have been deferred for one year. The reason for this is two-fold. First, funds to pay for the plaque (estimated \$4,400.00) have not been raised. Secondly the coordinator was confronted with a significant business opportunity which simply absorbed his time.

What has been accomplished in the last year is an agreement from the Italian side to allow our association to erect a plaque on the church wall, located some five hundred meters from the actual crossing. The regimental association held an October Festival, the purpose of which was to raise funds for the Melfa commemoration and some \$1,300.00 was raised. Another event will be held this year and for the same purpose. The Junior Ranks Club is very support of this undertaking and has informed the executive that we will receive their financial support. Our prospects for having funds in place for the Melfa River Crossing in Italy are very encouraging.

Something many of you may not know is that the Italy community celebrates the Melfa weekend 23-24 May along with us, as they regard this as a time of liberation for the Italians. For the Italian Melfa celebration in 2004 our association sent Len **Bailey** and George **Dominique** to Italy. Serving officer Captain Ben **Pong** also was able to travel to the Melfa area as part of his holiday. Reports from Len and George were most encouraging. They report that the Italian folks are very enthusiastic about our plans and would welcome all that would plan to attend. This year 2005, Lee **Cooke**, our association treasurer will be in Italy during the Melfa weekend and he will pass on our good wishes to our hosts.

Should any member wish to contribute to the Melfa Memorial which will be erected in Italy in 2006, you can make a donation to The Royal Westminster Regiment Association. A detailed report of the plans will be outlined in the Fall issue of the Groundsheet. **Jerry Gangur**, Coordinator

The Regiment's First World War Victoria Cross recipient, Filip Konowal, will have a plaque erected in Lens France in his honor on 22 August 2005. The coordinators of this event are Professor Lubomyr Lucuik of the Royal Military College and John B. Gregorovich of the Konowal Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

The Royal Westminster Regiment Association has joined the Royal Canadian Legion Konowal Branch 360 in Toronto and the Ukrainian Canadian Civil Liberties Association in plans to honor this World War hero. Our Association has made a financial contribution towards the cost of this memorial. Anyone visiting the memorial in future years will be see the Association's name engraved on the plaque alone with the other organizations that assisted in this project.

WO Terry Killam - Message From Bosnia

Bosnia? BiH, Boznia Hercegovina, Bosnia and Herzegovina – all names point to the same place. Some Bosnians are Serbs, some are Croats and some are Muslims. The vast majority of people refer to themselves as ‘Bosnians’, regardless of their religion. The term ‘Bosniak’, which was created after the war is seldom used. Many Bosnians had a religious upbringing but now do not actively attend religious ceremonies. However, this will not stop them from taking time off from work and celebrating religious holidays.

The main religions practised in Canton 1 are Orthodox (Catholics) and Islam (Muslims). Priests administer the Orthodox churches while a Hod•a administers each Mosque. The majority of people in Canton 1 consider themselves to be Muslims. Within Canton 1, we are bordered by Croatia in the North and West, Canton 10 to the South, and the WRS to the East. Our Area Of Responsibility [AOR] is comprised of 8 Opstina’s or municipalities: Bihac (the capital), Cazin, Sanski Most, Velika Kladuša, Bosanski Petrovac, Bosanska Krupa, Kljuc, and Bu•im. Each Opstina has a locally-elected mayor and is made up of many MZs or communities.

Half an hour invested in talking with the MZ representative [over coffee, a smoke and perhaps a little Slevo] can reveal more information about the MZ than any MAPEX, walking the ground or Recce would ever reveal. It is time well spent.

Why am I here?

I am here with the Liaison Observation Teams serving as the Sector Sergeant Major for Canton 1 HQ in Bihac that is Canadian and will be replaced by Canadians. We have 2 other houses situated in Cazin and Sanski Most. Cazin is manned by the British and they are turning over to a team from Norway in mid Feb. Sanski Most is manned by a Chilean team, turning over in mid March to a Canadian team. So as you can see it truly is a Multi Na-

tional Task Force (MNTF).

As Liaison Observation Teams (LOT), we are here to Liaise with the local populous and to observe the situation of the country as it continues to improve and return to normalcy and also to help promote and maintain a Safe And Secure Environment [SASE].

We do, in the process of our daily work, gather information; we do not gather intelligence. Intelligence is not gathered, information is gathered. Someone in a J2 post may take some of the information we have gathered and link it to other information they hold. This is when intelligence is created.

We are also able to deter and disrupt activities that are contrary to a SASE. LOT is the ‘tripwire’. It’s hoped that LOT will be sufficiently close to the Bosnians that they will be able to gather information which will improve the situational awareness of the region and will be able to indicate any threats to the SASE.

We appeared to the people of BiH overnight on the second of December 2004. We appeared overnight because we were a badge-change following the change of management of the Stabilization Force [SFOR], who has been here for many years. SFOR had been here for so many years, in fact, that generally the good people of BiH going about living their daily lives didn’t notice us as we went about ours.

So in conclusion, and simply put, we are here to Liaise and Observe the people of BiH and to provide a conduit for the passage of information back to EUFOR.

Looking forward to seeing everyone at the end of March.

Hello to all the Westies! Some of you may remember me from my time as the RSSO some fifteen years ago. Ted has asked me to send a 'life update' so here we go. When I left the Westies in 1990, I attended Staff College in Kingston and was then posted to 1 RCR where I held the appointments of 2ic Admin Coy and Adjutant. In the summer of 1993, I was sent to Croatia/Bosnia as an UNMO (United Nations Military Observer). During my travels I met up with some Westies and we shared some laughs among the shelling. I was involved with the ops in Medac, Sarajevo, Gorazde and Zepa. After returning to Canada, I spent two years studying at RMC before being promoted and taking up the post of Officer Commanding Leadership Company, The RCR Battle School in Petawawa.

In 1998, I found myself back in Bosnia, this time at the Multi-National Divisional HQ in Banja Luka as a staff officer in operations. It was quite interesting for me to see Bosnia recovering from the war having been there during the fighting. While I was in Bosnia, the CO of 3 RCR asked me to command Parachute Company on my return to Canada and after thinking about it for a microsecond, I agreed. I spent the next two and a half years having a super time. We did lots of training and then deployed to Bosnia to an AOR consisting of Tomislavgrad, Livno and Kupres. Those Westies who have served with UNPROFOR or SFOR will know where that is. It was a busy tour and one that had an interesting twist. My first task was to raid the local bank. So for the police officers in the unit, I think I can claim to be the only person in Canada who has raided a bank legally!

After Bosnia, I did a stint as DCO 3 RCR before being sent to North Yorkshire, England to work in the HQ of the Infantry Training Centre Catterick. This is where the British train their re-

cruits from civilian to trained infantryman. During operations in Iraq, we were graduating soldiers and then seeing them in combat three weeks later. It certainly validated the training in a real way. In July this year, I was sent to Shrivenham in Wiltshire where I am currently attending the Advanced Command and Staff Course. For those who can picture it, the college is about half an hour down the road from Oxford. After graduation, I am supposed to be posted to Kingston Ontario.

Melanie and I now have three children. Nick is 17, Jay is 15 and Samantha is 9. The boys are currently going to a Canadian school in Lanciano Italy. Samantha goes to school near where we live. Since there are officers from 50 nations attending my course, Samantha is in a school with lots of kids from around the world.

I have so many great memories of my time with the Westies, particularly the people. I know some have moved on and others have taken their place, but the Groundsheet continues to highlight the spirit that I knew while serving with you. One day, I will be back to visit and share a couple of brews with you. When, I can't predict but hopefully it will be sooner rather than later. Till then, Pro Rege et Patria.

Letter to Editor

Hi Ted: My name is Jim **Oldfield** and I am an avid reader of your Groundsheet. During World War II, I served as a platoon commander and later company 2 i/c in the Westminster Regiment. You suggested that people might write in with memories that might be used in the Groundsheet. Here's a brief note for you to consider: Near the end of the War, the Canadian government decided to move its troops in the Italian theatre up to Northwest Europe to join the rest of the Canadian Army. In this move, I was put in charge of the tracked vehicles and we started by ship from Italy to Marseilles, in southern France. Here we off-loaded and then loaded on railway flat cars for the rest of the journey to the Netherlands where the Canadian Army was then engaged. I asked for, and got, a boxcar into which I could rotate the drivers to give them a chance to warm up. It was February and bitter cold. Well, one of the drivers decided to brew up a pot of tea on a little Coleman stove. The train hit a rough spot and the little stove tipped over setting light to straw on the floor of the boxcar and in minutes the whole car was ablaze. The train stopped and we were able to unhook the boxcar but in minutes it was a total loss. At the next station, a very tall gendarme approached and enquired, "*Ou est le Commandant?*". In my best highschool French, I replied, "*Je suis le Commandant.*" He then handed me a sheaf of papers, which he wanted me to sign. I asked what the papers contained and he said that they described the fire incident and that I would thereby take the responsibility of paying to the French government the cost of one boxcar. After a few weeks of worrying I began to feel that perhaps no action would be taken, and so it was. I never heard anything further about the incident. But I have never been back to France, either. Kind regards to you, Ted. The Groundsheet is great and I look forward to receiving it. **Jim Oldfield**
