



Efforts are being made to send packages overseas for the members from the Association. Captain Rick **Blyth**, CO of 2822 army cadets in Surrey, is getting his cadets to put packages together for our troops. If you want to help out, call someone from our Executive.

The Melfa Weekend is coming up very quickly. This year the Executive decided the dinner will be held at the Roma Hall in Queensborough. Now if you want a traditional Italian meal prepared by the local Italian community, you won't want to miss this. Make sure you send in the tear-off portion on the last page. The golf will be Friday at Maple Ridge Golf Course and Terry **Leith** is looking after that. If you know a company willing to donate a few prizes, please send them in to Terry. The AGM is Sunday morning at the Armoury preceded by breakfast. Come and enjoy!

For those involved in the Primary Reserve, we now are paying into a pension plan. We also have the opportunity to buy back service to increase our contributions. This pension also includes those of us who serve the Cadet Instructors Cadre. As members of the PRes, we qualify as well. Of course to receive a pension there are a number of prerequisites that you must fall into in order to collect a pension when you leave the CF. In my case I will qualify because I served three summers (30 months) at Vernon Military Camp for the summer. There are some calculations you must work out to see if you qualify. As of my pay check for March, I now contribute to the CF Pension Fund. I think this is a huge boost to those that serve the reserve forces, especially considering many are now serving overseas for long periods of time and continue service upon returning to Canada. Not to forget about

those of us who have worked with the cadets branch for many years. Those that take the time to contribute to the cadet movement are, in many cases, as important as those that defend our country considering that working to mould are youth for the future is a difficult and time-consuming task.

Thirty more soldiers have just left the unit for work-up training in preparation of deployment next year. More details on that group will follow. We will also keep you informed via the web site as to when the troops will be coming home.

As a gesture of support, I've been provided the names and addresses of the families of the eight soldiers and they will receive a copy of this Groundsheet. We hope some of them will attend this years Melfa Dinner. The Executive will make sure they are invited.

It is Easter Sunday and I just finished watching the Masters Golf looking forward to a big Easter dinner with my family when I went and turned my computer on to find that six Canadian soldiers serving in Afghanistan were killed today in an explosion. That news simply turned my day into the opposite direction with emotion.

It just never gets better! As I was watching the ramp ceremony for the fallen six soldiers, it was announced two more soldiers were killed. My thoughts and prayers are with the families at this time.

I am trying to figure out a way to honour our fallen soldiers involved in this recent conflict. I proudly fly the Canadian flag on the front of my house and thought of lowering to half staff. Not sure if that is the answer but I know everytime I look at the flag, I think of those men & women who have given their lives in this recent conflict. Perhaps that is sufficient - keep them in my memory and keep flying my flag.

Did you watch any of the CBC Vimy special on TV around the Easter weekend? I thought that both the Vimy Re-dedication at the 4 hour-two part documdrama was great. I learned so much about Vimy and WWI that I never knew before. It started me thinking about my own relatives who served. Not sure if I have mentioned it but I have researched my family tree for many years now. I have already mentioned the fact, and many know, about my immediate family's participation in the Regiment. Both brothers, both grandfathers and father all served the Regiment. I also knew that a few great uncles had served but didn't know exactly where. I somewhat knew that at least one served the 104th. Well, I did some digging and found out that all three of my grandmother's brothers served in the 104th and all signed up for the CEF in 1915. Robert, Allen and Arthur Shaw are all listed on the Archives Canada WWI list and their attestation papers are there as well. At this time I am not sure if they went overseas. I have ordered their military records to find that out. Their photograph is posted on the Westie's web site if you care to have a look. Because I think it is a great photograph of a few very young (17 & 18 year olds) men who signed on the line to go overseas to fight in a war, I've included it in this edition so those that don't have access to the internet can view it. It certainly says a lot about our youth of that era.

# The Regiment

Greetings current and former Westies

As I write this, we are winding down our training year and looking forward to the summer. Our eight deployed soldiers, MCpl **Bason**, Cpl **Campbell**, Cpl **Guilmain**, Cpl **Iverson**, Cpl **Jackson**, Cpl **McIntyre**, Cpl **Stepan**, and Cpl **Zonnenberg**, are now into their third month in Afghanistan and will be looking forward to their mid-tour leave (aka HLTA). Sadly, by now they will have participated in two ramp ceremonies. A sobering reminder of the stakes in the job they are doing. We are all counting the days until their safe return sometime in August. I would be remiss if I didn't mention that our Regimental Association has really stepped up with providing several care packages for each of our eight deployed soldiers. I want to thank everyone that has participated in this crucial endeavour. I can't emphasize enough how important things like this are for the morale of our deployed soldiers.

The past few weeks have seen the departure of nearly thirty more soldiers from the Regiment. These troops are headed to Edmonton or Shilo to begin their pre-deployment training for Task Force (TF) 1-08 which will deploy to Afghanistan in February 2008. The way the army is transforming, we can expect this trend to continue with the next deployment after TF 1-08 being TF 3-09 which will deploy in August 2009 and begin workup training in October 2008.

As you might expect, the loss of almost forty of our soldiers to deployment or pre-deployment has left a large hole in our ranks particularly among NCOs, as so many of them answered the call. This will provide the opportunity next year for new junior leaders to emerge.

As for next year's plan our focus will remain patrolling and urban operations to which we will add a winter exercise. We intend to conduct a number of joint exercises with the Seaforth Highlanders, though the details are being worked out at the time of writing. We will contribute instructors to teach the Junior Leadership course and an Infantry Platoon Support Weapons Course (DP2A) and as usual, our training plan will emphasize my priorities of fitness, marksmanship, and Regimental identity. One other change for next year is that all units in the brigade including the Westies WILL PARADE ON WEDNESDAY NIGHTS starting in September. We are also welcoming Captain Dave Vernon who has joined us Class B as the Territorial Defence Battalion Operations Officer. By the time you receive this, he and the rest of us may be busy fighting floods...

As I mentioned in my last submission, we're still in the middle of a big push for recruits. If any of you know of suitable young men and women, encourage them to call recruiting at 604-666-4282 to learn more about how to become a Westie. In closing I'd like to thank all Westie soldiers for their hard work this past year. I'd also like to thank all spouses, former Westies and other members of the 'extended Westie family' for the support you've shown to our soldiers. Enjoy your summer and if we don't see you at Melfa we'll see you at stand-to on Wednesday September 5<sup>th</sup> 2007.

At the end of the bridge be in the left lane and turn left at the first set of lights at Howe St. Head straight south on Howe until you reach Ewen Ave. You will see the hall over to your left on the corner. (Brick building)Turn left on Ewen and then right into the lot. From the south or Surrey, follow Hwy 91A over the Alex Fraser into New Westminster and turn right on Howe Street. ### The Shaw Brother's

# 14 March 2007 NEWS RELEASE RCL Troop Morale Fund

OTTAWA – The Royal Canadian Legion has announced today it is initiating an "RCL Troop Morale Fund" to buy the troops deployed in Afghanistan a Tim Hortons coffee and a doughnut.

To launch and run the RCL Troop Morale Fund, the Legion is working with the Canadian Forces Personnel Support Agency (CFPSA) which operates the Tim Hortons outlet in Afghanistan.

The intention is to have Legion branches collect donations from members at Legion branches and have the branch send the funds to Dominion Command in Ottawa for disbursement. Whenever the fund reaches a specified level the required amount of coffee and doughnut certificates are ordered and overprinted with the line "This certificate courtesy of The Royal Canadian Legion and its supporters in Canada". They are then sent to Afghanistan for distribution by the CFPSA to the troops there.

Legion Dominion President Jack Frost sees the fund establishment as another way of helping the troops deployed in that location. "We help fund an annual show tour to that location and we are involved in Operation Santa Claus which ensures that they all get an annual Christmas present from the Legion. This effort will further show that we and many more Canadians care about their service and their sacrifices," he says. "It's a little gift but it means a lot, and it carries on our tradition of assistance to service people that we established in World War Two," he concludes. At that time the Legion was heavily involved in providing troops with morale boosting materials and educational upgrades.

To start the ball rolling, Dominion Command of the Legion has made the first donation and is preparing the first shipment of certificates for presentation. It is hoped that member and public donations will fund a weekly purchase of a coffee and a doughnut for each deployed troop as long as they are in that theatre of operations.
