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

The Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society

The Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society (CCMMS) has been in existence since 1998 when it was formed by a group of Chinese veterans. One of our long serving Association members and former serving officer of the Regiment, LCol Howe **Lee** CD,MSC,BScA,MEd is the current President of the society. Many Chinese have long been loyal and dedicated to the Canadian Forces and to our Regiment. In WWI, Private Frederick Lee from Kamloops enlisted and joined our 47th Battalion to serve overseas. Some 300 Chinese served Canada in WWI.

The CCMMS' main focus is the museum they operate in Vancouver. The museum is located at 555 Columbia St. and has been open since November 1998. According to it's newsletter, the museum has seen its share of some high profile VIP's as well.

A trip to the museum, which is open Tuesday to Sunday from 11am to 5pm. It is situated in the Chinese Cultural Centre on Pender at Columbia St. in Chinatown.

That is because their name was found in the RC Legion Last Post list and either they had a K47 number or are listed as serving in the Regiment. During the war, many men came and went from the ranks. Over 5000 in total. Some came to the unit, served for a short while and moved on. They were still in the Regiment. If their family lists them in the Last Post as a Westie, we will include them in the In Memoriam area.

Yesterday was Remembrance Day. For something different, my wife and I attend the service in Coquitlam. It started out in Como Lake School and then everyone moved to the small cenotaph in Blue Mtn Park after which a parade went to the Legion. I must say having ran the New Westminster service for the past 5 years, the Coquitlam service needs some help. It was an alright service but it could be much better. Okay where am I going with this? Well first, the speakers all talked about passing on the tradition to our youth so they carry on the message but there was no youth on the platform. That is something I incorporated in the City service. Youth - our kids and the cadets on stage and speaking. Secondly, the Coquitlam cenotaph needs to be upgraded to accomodate larger crowds. This little monument to our fallen sits amongst some majestic trees in Blue Mtn Park but that's it. When the large crowd gathered around, only about 10% could see what was going on. There are funds available from the feds for war memorial upgrades. I did send a short email to the Mayor but I haven't heard back. I gather when I corrected her about her twice reference to our soldiers in Afghanistan as "peacekeepers" in her speech, I guess I'm being ignored. The Coquitlam committee worked hard and they should be proud of what they did.

A note of thanks to Glen **Gates** and Barney **Jones** for their letters recently concerning a few of our members. Always great to hear from the membership. Barney's note was about the passing of Major Norm **Topham** who was a member of the Regiment back in the 1940s and he continued on with the PPCLI after the war and retired in 1968. I remember in 1972 at camp Vernon I was employed as a militia Corporal and got into a little trouble. I was hauled before the senior TrgO (Topham). When I marched in and was standing "on the carpet" before this obvioulsy well decorated WWII and long time soldier, I couldn't help but notice he had the Westie hat badge tattooed on his forearm. After getting my ass reamed out for my indescretion, I said "Sir, I couldn't help but notice your tattoo of the Westie hat badge. Were you a member of the Regiment?" His response was - "Corporal, I knew your grandfather, your father and and a few other members of your family. I don't think they would be proud of you right now. You are CB'd (confined to barracks) for three days. Dismissed!" In 1974 when I went back as a junior officer, we spoke and got to know each other a little better.

I had a very pleasant suprise when I walked into the BOR this morning. There seated at the back of the room was Sgt Ruby **Carey**. Ruby is a long time member of the Regiment and served on the Association executive for a number of years recently. So what was the suprise? Well Ruby transferred to the Regular Force and her first posting was as the BOR Admin NCO. Welcome home Ruby. Very nice to see you.

Greetings current and former Westies,

This past fall the Regiment was engaged running the individual battle task standard (IBTS) training for the rest of the brigade. This is the standard refresher training that all soldiers must complete annually. With that behind us, the Regiment is now running a machine gun course (now called the DP2A or Infantry Platoon Support Weapons Qualification) and the rifle company is gearing up for the live-fire platoon attacks that we will be conducting in April & May. At the Soldiers' Christmas Dinner, I had the pleasure of awarding the Regimental Marksman award to Pte **Morck**, and the Regimental PT Champion award to Pte **Brinson** (his second time winning this). We also created a new award, the 'Regimental Pugilist' which was won by Pte **Czakowski.** Part of his prize was to take on the CO, which was a bit unfair as he'd had to win about six bouts before jumping in the ring with me. Nonetheless, he managed to get the best of me, so his title is well deserved!

In November, we sent off LCol **Poitras** to Afghanistan, the first of the TF1-08 rotation. At the time of writing, Sgt **Bergan** and Cpls **Irvine** and **Buikema** have also arrived in theatre. In the next month or so, they'll be joined by twenty five more Westies, bringing the total to twenty nine. This deployment will be twice as large as the largest deployment the unit sent to Bosnia, and will be the largest we've sent into combat since the Second World War.

In January, 2008, in addition to our task as lead unit of the Territorial Battalion Group (TDBG), I have been made the commander of Task Force Lower Mainland. In this role, I will be responsible for coordinating the training of the lower mainland units. This honour was bestowed because of the outstanding achievements all members of the Regiment have made in the past few years. We are indisputably the best Militia unit in BC right now and that is due to the hard work put in by all ranks. Deserving of special mention are Capts Mackinnon and Vernon, 2Lt Sandulak, WOs Boyd, Kelly, and MacKay, Sgts Bell, Harley, and McKenna, MCpls Hygaard, Iverson, McRobert, and Mann, and Cpls Kullar, Tustin, MacKay. Who Else is Headed to War?

The following email was sent from Steve **Cowan** to Thomas **Bucheneaur** in early November 2007 and has been reprinted here with permission of Steve. For those that don't know Steve, he is a former serving officer of the Regiment and later transferred to the CIC. Steve is also a member of the Association.

Subject: OFF TO AFGHANISTAN

G'day Tom, Just back from 2-weeks pre-deployment training and selection process and I am pleased to advise that I have been selected for deployment to Afghanistan with a departure date of 18DEC07. I have to leave my uniform at home to go to war as a civilian travel coordinator with the Canadian Forces Personnel Support Agency (CFPSA) and I look forward to serving those who serve Canada.

I'll be based at Kandahar Airfield (KAF) and will be part of the CFPSA support team. There are some 70+ civilians and we look after home leave travel and claims (my speciality) as well as retail operations including Tim Hortons and the barber shop. We get to work 12-14 hours a day, seven days a week. Our palatial accommodations are a 6'x8' curtained space in a weather-haven tent with seven of our newest and closest friends, a block or so from the ablutions. Fine dining is in a mass cafeteria with plastic KFS. We get to wear the issued tan golf-shirt and trousers (shorts in the warm weather) with the attractive helmet and flak-jacket fashion accessories to be warn during rocket attacks and plane rides.

During the six-months contract I will get an 18-day leave period. Judy and I hope to get together in Jordan. I want to explore Wadi Rum, Petra and visit Aqaba, just like T.E. Lawrence.

I really think this is an idea opportunity to support our troops. I'm too old to go as a Reservist and the job compliments my 30-year airline career in arranging travel details and doing sums. I fell it is an honour to be selected. There were some 2,400 applicants. 107 attended the selection process and 96 finished. I was one of the 70+ selected (there are about 15 travel jobs at various locations).

Tell any Westies going to KAF to come see their old paymaster. They will anyway as I'll be looking after their leave and they will want that! I like your offer to come and talk to your RUSI Group, maybe next autumn and I finish KAF and then the summer aboard HMNCS QUADRA.

Museum Receives Work of Art

The Museum of The Royal Westminster Regiment has just taken delivery of a piece of hand crafted furniture to display a very important document. Wayne **McCallum** of Coquitlam served in the Regiment back in the late 1960s after being recruited during the 'peace and love' era. Wayne served for a few years and never came back into the Armoury until he decided to take a look at the museum in 2006. Upon meeting our curator Herb Hamm, Wayne never realized how much of an important and significant role he will play in the museum's future.

As most of you know, the museum has produced a Memorial Book of our fallen soldiers from both world wars. Over 600 names adorn this treasured work of our history. The idea was that when the book was completed a case would have to be built in order to display the book and also protect it. That's where Wayne **McCallum** enters the picture. Wayne describes himself as an "amateur woodworker" and decided to help the museum out by producing the display stand for the Memorial Book. Until you see what Wayne produced the word "amateur" should not be used.

Wayne was helping a friend rebuild a log cabin on Vancouver Island and this required some trees to be taken down. From these trees, Wayne milled the lumber and dried it out and started building the display case from some Maple he and his friend had saved. As a result of Wayne's fine craftsmen skills, a wonderful piece of furniture has been produced.

As you can see from the two images on this page, Wayne has done a great job. More photographs and Wayne's story is available on the Associations web site. Please have a look when you have a chance as it shows how the display case went from a tree to the finished product.

LCol Doug Poitras in Afghanistan

I am the J5, Afghan Regional Integration Command - South, the organization responsible for the training of the Afghan National Army and Police. Although my staff of five and I are the headquarters planners, we are primarily tasked with police training. Our coalition soldiers and police mentor and train the Afghan National Police and help turn them into a more professional force: policemen that are trusted and respected by the Afghan people. Our Region is 1 of 5 in Afghanistan: Central, East, South, West, and North. Our Regions correspond to Afghan National Army Corps Commands and to Afghan Regional Police Commands. As the media correctly reports, the Southern Region is the most dangerous region of the country, accounting for approximately 60% of the national significant incidents (SIGINTs) such as troops in contact (TIC) or improvised explosive devices (IEDs). The Southern Region is comprised of 6 provinces - Nimroz, Helmand, Kandahar, Zabul, Uruzgan, and Dai Kundi. We have forces in 4 (Helmand, Kandahar, Zabul, and Uruzgan). We have 15 twelve-sixteen man US Police Mentor Teams, 6 Canadian Police Teams, and 6 UK Police Teams. We have US Teams in the 4 Provinces and work with the Canadians in Kandahar and the Brits in Helmand. Our Teams run 3 or 4 Up armoured HMMWVs that are like "little tanks" and provide us very good protection from enemy bombs, rockets, mortars, and gunfire.

As I said before, we work with, mentor, and train the Afghan National Police in our area. This is a challenge in a Country that has had 40 years of peace in the last 300 years that suffered from the Russian occupation and suffered even more at the hands of the Taliban. Government structure and infrastructure is not robust and there is a certain amount of dysfunction in the culture and people because of what they have endured in the past. On the positive side, Afghans are great fighters, truly courageous and many are willing to happily work with us to make their Country more stable, more peaceful, more prosperous, and generally a better place for their children and grandchildren to live and prosper. We work with the Afghan Police and the Afghan Government to bring the Afghan people hope. The insurgency perverts Islam and preys on the fears and ignorance of the people through lies and inflicting pain.

How are we doing? We are making progress through (a) reforming the leadership, (b) reforming pay, (c) getting rid of bad, corrupt police, (d) recruiting better, more honest police, (e) providing better training, (f) providing better tactics and police procedures, and (g) providing better equipment. The Afghan Police bear the brunt of the insurgency because the police, unlike the Afghan Army and even our Coalition forces, are always out in small groups in all communities across the Country. The police make more attractive targets for the insurgents because they are more spread out than the Army, less well armed and equipped, and the police operate in smaller groups. We have had hundreds of police killed by insurgents in our region. In comparison, we have killed thousands of insurgents. We are getting better though. With better training and equipment, the police are better able to defend themselves. By eliminating some of the smaller checkpoints, consolidating police at larger police substations, reinforcing the police with coalition forces, and having the police actively patrol along with coalition forces, we are increasing the survivability of the police and increasing the security that we help them provide to the citizens of Afghanistan.

The Afghan Ministry of Interior has been improving the leadership of the police through objective testing, evaluations, and assignments. Most of the senior police we work with in our area are honest, upright citizens, who are loyal to their central government and dedicated to making their country a freer and

safer place for all Afghans. Pay has been equalized with the Army and soon most police will be making \$100 per month which is not much in Western terms but is an adequate living here in Afghanistan and much better than many have it here.

We have recently begun a new strategic training initiative: Focused District Development. Under this Plan, FDD for short, we are training police from selected districts by assigning replacement policemen into the selected districts for 2 months, and then pulling the regular policemen and sending them all as a group to one of several police academies for 2 months of intensive training. We have just started this initiative and our initial indications and feedback from our communities is that this program is improving the quality and professionalism of our police. We also work with other coalition forces, government and non-government aid organizations to help the local citizens in our area by conducting medical assistance visits in local villages, helping them get school supplies, helping them get wells for better water, and build needed schools and roads.

In short, we are making slow, steady progress towards building a country, where an Afghan society of children can play and go to school in peace, and parents can work, attend mosque, and practice their faith; all without interference and fear of death by ignorant, power-hungry, misguided criminals.
