

#### The Regiment

Since the last issue of the Ground Sheet, the Regiment has being very busy along three main parallel lines of activity:

- a. preparations for the Brigade Training Event in Idaho Exercise Cougar Salvo 12;
- b. running the DP2A Course (Infantry Support Weapons Qualification); and
- c. preparations for the Regiment's 150th Anniversary next year.

Exercise Cougar Salvo 12 will be conducted during the last week in April and the first week in May and will culminate in a company level combined arms live fire range - something most soldiers in the unit have never had the opportunity to participate in. This is not the activity that one drops into cold. Preparations have been mounting since January so as to ensure our soldiers hit the ground well-prepared, confident and cohesive.

A major step on the road to Cougar Salvo was Exercise Cougar Ducimus conducted in the Chilliwack Training Area in February. This was the first opportunity for all four BC infantry units to get together and "shake out" in the organizations they will be using for the exercise. The results were positive with over 200 participants and two companies practicing attacks.

The Infantry Support Weapons Course culminated in a Gun Camp in Yakima. With plenty of ammunition to spare, it was an excellent learning opportunity.

Also in February, the Regiment hosted the traditional Annual Dinner. This is the Regiment's most important community relations event of the year although it is often mistakenly referred to as the "Officers' Dinner", it requires, in fact, a whole-Regiment effort to make it a success. Everyone puts on a good show to help strengthen the ties between the Regiment and the community leaders, politicians and other special guests. My thanks go out to all who helped - particularly members of the Westie Volunteer Band, Sgt Buikema as Chief Steward, Sgt Walsh as Quarter Guard Commander and Cpl Kingston as the "Wine Czar". As can be expected the soldiers were excellent both in their turn out and performance.

In addition to the Gun Camp in Yakima, the unit also ran Exercise Corbould Force (named in honour of the famous Second World War CO). This exercise, and the practice sessions leading up to it, focused mainly on urban warfare.

Although not necessarily related to pre-Cougar Salvo training, it was a chance to switch gears and do something a little more interesting for the soldiers. A good time was had by all.

In April, Col Gagne presented the first ever 39 CBG Commanders' Unit Commendation to the Regiment for its professionalism in conducted the funeral for Cpl Tyler Berg. The CO, LCol Doug Poitras, humbly accepted the commendation "on behalf of Tyler's friends in the Regiment." During the same parade, Sgt Todd Singer was commissioned as a Lt. This is the first time an NCO has been commissioned in four years and we all know Lt Singer will do an excellent job.

# <u>Career revamped: A Soldier's transition into school after the Afghan War</u> March 28, 2012

How hard it to find a job in this day and age? What are employers looking for? How do you tailor your resume what potential employers are looking for? Has it become easier to find a job now than just a few years ago? What about a person returning home from war? These are just some of the questions that are facing many Canadian Forces soldiers and that is just the situation that Sergeant Joseph Cullen faced upon his return home. I sat down with this solider to get a fresh perspective on the economy from a veteran of the Afghanistan War and find out how he plans to deal with this situation as he integrates back into civilian life.

Sgt. Cullen plans to head back to school this September in order to obtain a Geomatics Diploma of Technology from the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT). He will do some on the job training in June and continue his classroom portion this fall. The concentration that he chose to pursue is the field survey option. This diploma is essential for him to start his career in Geomatics. He said that he is "sincerely excited and that heading back to school has been a goal (dare I say dream) of mine for a few years now". Moving forward Sgt. Cullen has outlined his personal and professional goals some of which are to start his career with a reputable company, move from his condo to a house and marrying his finance and start a family. This opportunity was provided by Tyler Charkie; HR Advisor, and the McElhanney Land Surveys Ltd. This company is known for projects like the Capilano Suspension Bridge's Treetop

Adventure Design and the Sea to Sky Highway design build. Both projects are award winning projects.

Sgt. Cullen was 17 when he joined the Army and when he was asked what motivated him to join he replied: "I would have given an answer involving patriotism and love of the infantry, but in reality it was probably because I wanted to be different and look cool. Only after a couple years in, and especially after my first tour, did I understand the depth of real patriotism and unit pride." His grandfather was an officer in the Portuguese Army Reserves and is whom he is named after. Joseph currently serves with the Royal Westminster Regiment and has been on 2 tours of duty; Yugoslavia in 2002 and Afghanistan in 2011. The most memorable experience he had overseas was at Christmas in a small Croat village in Bosnia where his platoon brought the villagers vegetables and meat, and they were invited into an elderly lady's house for coffee and cookies. His military career has allowed him to be an instructor of many military courses including Basic Infantry Qualification (BIQ), Basic Military Qualification (BMQ), Basic Military Qualification – Land (BMQ-L) and Infantry Platoon Support Weapons Qualification.

He has served with the Canadian Forces for several years now and faces new challenges coming home among fellow soldiers. He feels that the hardest challenge entering the workforce was getting that initial interview and being surprised by how many company's didn't call back. Sgt. Cullen went on to say "I completely underestimated the amount of competition out there." He feels that even though the vast majority of society accepts soldiers upon returning home, even if they don't support the mission, getting a job and finding employment is not any easier. "The biggest challenge for a reserve soldier is what to do next... civilian jobs are difficult to attain, and rarely have comparable income. Many soldiers simply sign-up for another tour or join the regular force."

His perspective on life and society has been changed by the Canadian Forces. On his first tour in Bosnia, "It was the first time I saw true poverty and also the first time I saw true generosity. This was reinforced in Afghanistan. I am truly appreciative of how great life is in Canada." The advice that he gives new recruits coming into the Canadian Forces is to "make sure that you are willing and able to put the time in to go on courses, contribute on exercises, and be keen and stand out so that you will be picked to go on course." He went on to explain that the military produces quality individuals with unique leadership qualities and proven abilities. They are able to absorb information and the ability to apply that information efficiently. This is something that both employers and schools need to recognize and help integrate soldiers back into the workforce. Cullen feels that BCIT has done a great job when it comes to identifying this and other post-secondary institutions would benefit from similar programs. The Sergeant is grateful of his situation and goes on to say that "I should have listened to my mother and completed Math 12 when I was actually in Gr. 12, instead of when I was 30 and wanting to get into BCIT!" He is ambitious to take on his educational endeavor and jumpstart his new career later this year.
