

The Regiment

Since our last report, the Westies have completed another series of exercises and are now preparing for summer. From January 23-25, the Westies traveled to Manning Park for Ex WESTIE DELIVERANCE, accompanied by soldiers from 12 Field Ambulance and 15 Field Regiment RCA. The aim of the exercise was to simulate operations in an arctic environment, including the conduct of defensive operations and reconnaissance patrols.

Three platoons from the Royal Westminster Regiment faced off against one other during Ex WESTIE WARRIOR, which took place from February 19-22. The platoons were divided into both offensive and defensive positions, and tasked to probe for weaknesses within their lines. The exercise was intended to replicate real-life scenarios similar to ones encountered by Canadian Forces during recent overseas operations.

Looking ahead, the Westies will again be competing against other 39 CBG units in the Blair Shoot from April 24-25. The competition will be divided into individual shooters and teams of four, and will consist of firing the C7 rifle, C9 LMG and 9mm pistols. The goal is to recognize and award top marksmen within 39 CBG.

Shortly afterwards, the Westies will be traveling to Yakima, WA from April 30 to May 3 for Ex DUCIMUS THUNDER. The exercise will be represented by all Brigade units with the intent of performing combined arms training in a defensive context, including a live fire portion. The live fire segment will utilize a state-of-the-art interactive target system, which is the only one of its kind located on the west coast.

From May 15-17 the Westies will be conducting Ex WESTIE SHARPSHOOTER in Chilliwack in order to complete soldier Personal Weapons Test and Individual Battle Task Standard training. Concurrently, the Regiment will be leading the conduct of a 39 CBG Basic Military Officer Qualification (Land) from May 14-24 (also in Chilliwack). This course constitutes the second phase in an officer candidate's training plan, which is designed to develop a junior officer's leadership capabilities.

Additionally throughout the summer, the Westies will be participating in numerous community relations events. These include the Cloverdale Rodeo (May 15-18), Hyack Parade (May 23) and the Abbotsford International Airshow (August 7-10). Following the Hyack Parade on May 23rd, the Regiment will hold the annual Melfa dinner marking the 71st anniversary of the Melfa River Crossing. Members of the Regiment, as well as guests from the community, will be invited to the dinner in remembrance of the bravery of Major John K. Mahony and the rest of the soldiers who fought alongside him.

The annual summer adventure training exercise, known as Ex WESTIE PEAKBAGGER, will be held in Chilliwack from July 24-26. This will be a Level 1 mountaineering expedition including rock climbing and glacier travel. The group will travel to the Slesse Creek Demolition Area before continuing to the alpine bivouac site where they will participate in safety and mountaineering training. From there, they will ascend to two separate peaks near the USA border before returning to base.

Finally, the annual Brigade Training Event, Ex COUGAR DESTROYER is scheduled from August 14-23 in the Chilcotin Valley. This joint operations exercise represents the culmination of the year's training and is an outstanding opportunity for soldiers to work in tandem with other units, as well as build upon essential combat related skills.

After Remembrance Day we when on our back to basic FTX out at Lt Mulders place in Hope and we got rained on very hard, when the rain did let up a little we managed to go for a hike up the old mine. The corps was using improvised shelters but the cadets managed to stay try and we only had two wet sleeping bags all week end.

December we had our Christmas mess dinner, Lt Col David Vernon, CWO Mike Kelly attended and Mrs. Karen Cassie who was presented with Lt Don Cassie's certificate of service and lapel pins for his sons.

- Veterans (former members of the CAF) and their families, including families of the deceased
- Members of foreign military currently serving with the CAF and their families
- Current Staff of the Non-Public Funds, Canadian Forces (NPF, CF)
- Current staff of Military Family Resource Centres (MFRCs)

A \$5.00 fee applies if you are part of the following categories:

- Current Department of National Defence (DND) public servants and their families
- Serving and former Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) and their families
- Current staff of Defence Research and Development Canada (DRDC) and their families
- Current staff of Defence Construction Canada (DCC) and their families
- Current staff of Canadian Securities Establishment (CSE) and their families
- Honourary Colonels/Captains(N), Lieutenant Colonels/Commanders and their families
- Former Staff of the Non-Public Funds, Canadian Forces with a pension and their families
- Former Staff of Department of National Defence (DND) with a pension and their families
- · Family members of the Staff of the NPF, CF
- Family members of the MFRCs

Why is there a fee? The \$5 fee is to recover the production and delivery costs associated with each CFOne card. A waiver of the fee has been granted to those named in the National Defence Act and those who provide direct morale and welfare services to them.
