

Dear Len:

I am enclosing an obituary notice and another newspaper clipping referring to Wilf TYO, one of the 6 Cornwall and area who served with the Westminster Rgt. (M).

Wilf and his brother William (Bill) were assigned to the Westies while we were in Italy and served the rest of the war with the Regt. He was a proud member of the unit and was always decked out on the Nov. 11th parade with his beret and Westie badge, We met regularly at a Nov. 10th dinner put on by the local Legion for veterans and other service personnel. Also included is another clipping pertaining to Wilf that you might find interesting.

I enlisted in Nov. 1940 with the Victoria Rifles,a Montreal reg9ment and after serving from Nf1d to Nanaimo was sent o/s on a draft following the breakup of the unit. I was assigned to the Westies in Sept. 1943 and served in "A" company signals until early June 1945 when I volunteered for the Pacific Force. I considered myself fortunate to have been a member of the Westminster Regt.(M), a great unit with a fine group of officers and other N.C.O's led by our Company Commander, J.K.Mahony and then Maj.Neil. I returned to Canada for leave and then with surrender of Japan wasdischarged in Sept. 1945.

It is sad to note that I am the last living member of the other five from the area and being in my 93rd year ny time is limited.

I enjoy reading the Groundsheet and am enclosing a small cheque to be used for some purpose at the May $23 \, \text{rd}$ dinner.

It does however lead us to an interesting conversation about commemoration; specifically what we are going to do as an association and a regimental family for the 75th anniversary of the Melfa Crossing. Rest assured that we will not let this date pass us by and we will commemorate it, and we are currently meeting with the command team of the regiment to figure out the 5 W's on what is going to occur. We also will be having another important commemorative event in the future as the regimental colour may be updated to Reflect the AFGHANISTAN battle honour that has been bestowed on the regiment.

There are some other updates that I'd like to draw your attention too, and particularly emphasise that those things you bring up to us in correspondence and at the AGM produce action in this association. It was identified that the flag poles inside the armoury needed upgrading. Broomsticks and gun tape worked for a while, but a better product was deserved. So we've acted, and contributed funds to the regiment to replace the provincial and territorial flags hanging above the parade square. It was identified that the BBQ's that the regiment had were weathered and old. A new one was provided by the association for the regiment to use as it sees fit. As the minister of veterans affairs often says "a gap was identified" and that gap was that there should

be a post secondary scholarship that serving members could apply for. We've done work on that, and identified the funds to be provided. We've established a criteria to apply for the scholarship as well as the adjudication plan for assigning the scholarship. Details will be coming soon but I'll use this forum to make this point clear. This scholarship will be a substantial amount of money, and the recipient will be someone that both the regiment and the association can say is a deserving member. Details to follow.

Its important for me to let you know thats there's a change coming in the groundsheet team. Len is taking a break and he's earned it. Producing this publication is one of the more time consuming endeavours we do, but its vital to maintaining communication and for its historical content. Thanks Len. And thanks to Sgt Paul Guilmain for stepping up in his place. We can all help Paul, and we will all help Paul as we move forward. But the good news is there's work to do here, and we can still be part of the crew that affects positive change on Canada, by helping look after the lads that still wear the uniform.

The Regiment

Since our report this past spring, the Westies have participated in a number of exercises, completed the summer individual training cycle, and responded to various taskings across Canada.

From April 30 to May 3, the Westies, along with over 200 soldiers from eight different units across 39 CBG, took part in Exercise DUCIMUS THUNDER 15. The intent of the exercise was to conduct a combined arms training event, focusing on infantry routine in the defense. The exercise took place at Yakima Training Center in Washington State, and featured state-of-the-art interactive targeting systems and live role-playing actors who simulated civilian and irregular force scenarios – all throughout a training area containing 327,000 acres of terrain that was well suited for live fire and maneuvering. In particular, the exercise provided a valuable opportunity to train in a physical environment markedly different from southern British Columbia.

The summer was also a very active period, with Westies participating in a number of taskings, courses and community relations events, including appearances at the Cloverdale Rodeo, the Hyack Parade and the Abbotsford International Airshow. Following the Hyack Parade on May 23rd, members of the community as well as the Regiment gathered in the New Westminster Armoury for the annual Melfa Dinner, with this year marking the 71st anniversary of the Melfa River crossing.

A particularly notable tasking this summer involved sending four Westies to Ottawa as members of the Ceremonial Guard to watch over the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Corporal Taj Aujla was among the four from the Royal Westminster Regiment, and was featured in the Ottawa Citizen News as he was the first Canadian Sikh soldier to stand guard at this National War Memorial.

The Brigade Training Exercise, Ex COUGAR DESTROYER 15, took place in the Chilcotin training area, and included (aside from all British Columbia Army Reserve units) soldiers from 1 PPCLI as well as 54 MP Company from the US Army. The exercise was a great interoperability training opportunity for the Westies as many unit soldiers were integrated with their American peers, teaching and learning from each other. Training objectives included recce patrols, withdrawals, defensive operations, and fighting against a mechanized opposing force.

Finally, the new training year was kicked off in full swing with Ex WESTIE TRIDENT 15. A stand-based training exercise in the Chilliwack area, sections competed against each other in conducting recce patrols, section attacks, and casualty evacuation scenarios. The exercise was well received and provided everyone a chance to step out of their comfort zones – a good indication of what's to come in the new training year.

1789 RCACC – Westie Cadets in Hope

Another training year has started for all the cadet units and most of the Corps have already undertaken their Fall Field Training exercises. Since it is early in the training year, there is not much to report, so I will provide a Vernon story.

During the summer months all the Cadets go to Cadet Training Centres (CTCs) across Canada and abroad. The 1789 Westie Cadets from Hope were no exception with six cadets off to Vernon CTC, one Cadet off to Connaught CTC in Ontario and one was off to Outward Bound Course in Wales, UK. All Cadets performed well and came back with excellent anecdotes AND our Connaught course cadet earning a spot on next year's Bisley Team as a spare.



This past summer I was able to get the summer off work and went to Vernon CTC as the Adjutant, so I decided that the Corps mascot, "Sgt Bruin" should join me as the unofficial Assistant Adjutant. For Christmas 2013, I donated this WWF Grizzly Bear to the Corps as a Christmas present and "Sgt Bruin" has always been an absolute hit in the specially tailored uniform made for him by one of our talented Cadet mothers, Ms. Elisabeth Sell.
