ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

As you may remember several years ago your Association decided to establish a program of Achievement Awards designed to show the communities appreciation to young people who had done something out of the ordinary and shown themselves to be "Good Citizens." At the time of establishing the awards, then President Bert Hoskin said that we always seemed to hear of the way the younger generation was going to the dogs, but rarely did we hear of the fine deeds that so many younger people were involved in. The Achievement Award program is our modest attempt to show that we appreciate our young people.

This year's awards were as follows, you have already read about the award to Cadet W. O. Usher in an earlier Groundsheet.

- Cadet W. O. Usher was awarded \$100 for recognition of the credit he brought to the name of The Royal Westminster Regiment in having been named Best Cadet in the United Kingdom Leadership Course among all cadets from the Commonwealth in 1975.
- 2. Lyle Edward Meridith, a young man who has been a paraplegic since the age of seven. Since leaving hospital he has applied himself to helping other handicapped people. As the Assistant Executive Director of the Handicapped Resource Centre since 1972 he has, by determination, ability and effort, helped make that organization a very important source of encouragement and help to hundreds of handicapped individuals.

3. Jerry Milne, age 18, a customer in a New Westminster corner grocery when an armed holdup took place. He followed the culprits in his car, running one of them down. As a result of his unselfish and courageous actions the New Westminster police were able to clear up a number of similar crimes.

Both Milne and Meridith were awarded a cheque for \$100 from your Association.

As the Award is a continuing program we are always on the lookout for similar instances which would qualify. Please let us know if you hear or read of any activity by a young person which you feel should be considered by the Awards Committee. MUSEUM COMMITTEE REPORT

The Museum Committee resumed its regular meetings 25 Oct., Bert Hoskin in the chair. Basil Morgan and Walter Tyler gave their reports of the Annual Meeting of The Organization of Military Museums in Canada (OMMC) which they attended as our representatives at Kingston, early in August. These meetings are important for museums like ours for several reasons, amongst them the opportunity to meet informally the executive of The Canadian Forces Museum Committee (who help to fund our operation) and other influential people in the Government and in museum work.

Attendance at the meeting was possible without using our precious dollars because "service" flights provided the transportation and the OMMC housed and fed the delegates at RMC very handsomely. (Incidentally, RMC celebrates its centenary this year.) A quite elaborate schedule of meetings and events was laid on, which brought Bas and Walt back home full of praise for this organization we belong to.

During the summer the Committee did not meet but for most of the time the Museum was open, in spite of the Armoury being unusually quiet during July and August. Sgt. Doreen Cull, formerly Orderly Room Sgt. for The Regiment (and still a serving member) is the Assistant Curator and is employed to attend the Museum Mondays 9 to 12 and 1 to 3. As well as Wednesdays and Fridays 1 to 3. She is developing a very complete knowledge of our collection and is bringing our catalogue and inventory up to date.

Dick Shannon (K47159) has joined the Committee. Specific duties have not yet been assigned to Dick but he has already begun to learn the routine for accessions and, having retired, will be able to give some time to attendance at the Museum and maintain open hours for the public. Dick and Ed Shannon have a brother, Henry, who is a radio broadcaster in Toronto. Henry spent some hours in the Museum recently for the purpose, in part, of gathering material for a program on The Westminsters. He regularly airs programs about Canadian units.

Visitors after the November 11th ceremony crowded our little space. (Perhaps we shouldn't complain, since we are lucky enough to have the old gun room and the 750 square feet it provides, but we do need more space for the adequate display of our collection, and its preparation, and also usable space for the staff to work. There is value of several kinds in being in the Armoury but space is always a problem.

Dave Adlem, treasurer and W.W. 1 historian was a Monday A.M. regular but has changed his attendance to allow the addition of his wife to assist, they will be at the museum on Tuesday evenings as a hard working team.

It is planned to have a Founding Members Tea sometime in the spring of the year, Basil Morgan and his committee have been doing some basic planning on the function but have been thinking how desirable it would be to have a Ladies Auxiliary to assist in this type of affair.

Finances of the museum are just about at a zero balance but we hope to receive our annual allowance from the Association and the grant from the Canadian Force Museum Committee which should allow us to operate for another year. If it were not for the outstanding support we get from our volunteers we would be in sad shape indeed. If anyone with a clerical bent and some spare time wishes to assist a few hours a week we can assure you, your help would be more than welcome.

REGIMENTAL UP-DATE

The 1975/76 training year was concluded with the Militia Concentration of those units within Militia Area Pacific which was held at Fort Lewis, Washington. The U.S. Army proved to be most gracious hosts. The training facilities there are second to none and we made excellent use of them. Immediately upon our return we proceeded to fulfil our commitment for the Olympic Games. Members of the Regiment were attached to the Canadian Airborne Regiment, CFB Montreal and CFB Kingston. While they may not have seen much of the games they certainly contributed to their success.

During the past year several members of the Regiment earned their parachute wings. These were Capt. John Lamb, Lt. G. Rust, WO B. Howells and WO E. Farkas. WO Farkas has subsequently left the unit to pursue higher education in the United States and has joined the U.S. National Guard.

The 1976/77 training year is off to a good start. We are presently conducting 4 TQ2 Courses. These are trade courses at the secondary level which are required before a man can take a Jr. NCO course. These courses are Machine Gunner, Communicator, Sniper and Driver. While we have had some attrition during the summer months we are still in the position of being unable to recruit any appreciable number of new members as the result of our being over establishment.

Two old friends have returned to service with the Regiment. Major Ray Smith has taken over the duties of the Cadet Liaison Officer. He will be visiting each of our four sponsored and affiliated cadet corps once a month. Major Cam Beckett has returned as the unit MO. Both these officers have many years of experience in the service and we are very pleased to have them back in the fold.

During the past year five members of the Regiment served with the Canadian Contingent to the UN Truce Team in the Middle East. All are home now. They were stationed in such exotic places as Ismailia, Damascus and the Golan Heights. They brought back many interesting tales and experiences. In the ensuing year more members of the unit will be given the opportunity of serving in the Middle East or in Cypress. It is also likely that we will be sending personnel on attachment to the 4CMBG in Germany.

We especially ask that any of you who hear of any old Westie who may be in hospital to give Bill a call so that he can make arrangements to visit them. Quite often Bill's channels of information leave it to chance for him to find out the location of the various patients.

Naturally some of the information we can pass along will be dated so if you have an inquiry or some information for Bill please give him a call at 254-2876 or drop him a line in care

of the Association.

Here then is Bill's first report:

Hospital visits so far this year have been a little different than in previous years, fortunately there have been fewer patients. At the time of writing this report we have only one in the Shaughnessy Hospital. Sam Fraser who is an old 47th from the first war. Sam recognizes me when I make my visit and is not adverse to telling me to 'Speak oop mon, I canna hear ye!' I usually try to visit in the afternoon to avoid waking him up, he enjoys the cookies and we both enjoy a chat.

One of my regulars is John Shepherd at the New Vista Society, a nice place near Edmonds St. and Grandview. John appreciates the cookies and books which I try to take each visit, quite often John will call me on the phone for a chat. Bob Norris is still in isolation in the Royal Columban Hospital and although I cannot get in to visit I do leave a message to let him know we are thinking of him. I see Ed Greame at his home on a regular basis and he welcomes the cigarettes, magazines and books which I try to take along each time. Ed is unable to get around too freely as he lost a leg a few years ago, but he remains cheerful and maintains a strong interest in opera. Jim Wilson was in the Maple Ridge Hospital recovering from a heart attack, and at last reports was progressing well and had lost some weight to help in his recovery.

Please call me if you hear of any of our fellows who are ill so I can add them to my visiting list. — BILL ROBSON
