The Draw is not a hard way to make Dollars, really, for anyone-The net net being \$ 2,031.92 & \$ 258.34 accruing to our benefit \$ 2,290.00 -- the main responsibility being the administration and control -- which has been my pleasure and privilege for many years.

In addition to these Returns, let us not lose sight that so many of our members do not take the four legal free tickets, but instead turn in gross proceeds of book sales. This extra \$2.00 per book is treated as "Donation" and this year amounted to \$ 1,079.00.

The Draw has another attraction

in that it reminds our members of their own responsibility i.e. Dues. So when they make the Draw returns, so many use the same letter to pay dues and also add a little for Sick & Visiting, Museum or "as you see fit". This figure for 1981 was \$418.00 included with the Draw return cheque plus considerably more in separate cheques not taken to account with the Draw but turned over to the Secretary as received

Who contributed to this successgenerally everyone, to greater or lesser degrees. I must express sincere acknowledgement for the effort by Col. Fred Wilks for the Regimental effort -- his was more than just the C.O. talking -- it was a personal thing with him this year. To our major sellers -- 10 - 15 - 25 or more books, sincere gratitude. Stan Moorhouse, take a bow. He organized and controlled the outside sales through Banks, Malls, etc. A good effort, and should be encouraged. Basil Morgan initiated a program on his own -a pilot for the future, both of these efforts showed what a little extra can do.

I highly recommend this means of fund-raising to the incoming Executive -- start early. Encourage membership sales and run a tight administration. Only success can follow.

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#### TRUSTEE REPORT for 1981

I am pleased to report, on behalf of the three appointed Trustees, Allan Coe, Pat McCarthy and Bert Stephens that the Trustee Fund is in excellent condition.

This is in part due to the high interest rates obtained for our investment during 1981. These varied from a low of 14.25% to a high of 18%.

It might be worth pointing out to the membership that the interest earned by the trust fund is made available, on request, to the Association for use in the day to day operation of the Association.

Since 1980, when the Fund was reorganized, the Association has withdrawn \$ 1,945.25 in interest from the Fund. Of this, they repaid \$ 500.00, leaving a net income of \$ 1,445.25 over a two year period. Any interest not used by the Association is added to the principal amount and reinvested.

The Trust Fund is now valued at \$ 12,234.04.

(This amount is as of April 3rd, 1982 the maturity date of the current deposit).

It is your Trustees recommendation that the Fund continue to be invested in short term deposits, which have proven so favourable in the past year. This also insures a maximum investment income with no risk to the capital.

#### GROUNDSHEET REPORT

The 'Groundsheet' went to press every two months in '81, except for July and August. It has been produced about as economically as is possible, unless being 'writ by hand' and delivered by same was being considered. The continuing inflation of printing costs and postage unfortunately increase the yearly amount expended, but even with that, we have cut production expenses from \$ 1,898.57 in '77 to \$ 1,156.00 in '81.

The actual work of assembling, addressing and mailing the paper has become more of an enjoyable get-together, thanks to the unstinting co-operation of members when asked to assist, and for their cheerful giving of their time and effort I wish to thank them most heartily.

Keeping the mailing list up-to-date, on who is still with us and who has moved, is an on-going task, but our Secretary, with assistance, keeps a close eye on it, and it is in pretty good shape at the present time.

Production should be normal for the coming year.


#### AFNUAL GENERAL MEETING


