ARE YOU LISTENING?

For years your Executive and others have been pushing the panic button asking members of the Association to tell us of any event or recollection which will help us in our endeavour to leave for posterity as complete a Regimental history as possible. Alas, one by one Time takes its toll, and another member and another part of our history is lost forever.

We know that many have asked themselves, 'What could I possibly contribute that would be of any historical significance?' Well, the history of a Regiment is evolved over many years through the actions of its members, sometimes heroic, serious, humorous, tragic, sad, but always significant. No one knows better than we do of the value of seemingly insignificant things, things which unlock the door to yet another page in our history.

Let us give an example of what time, procrastination and archivial loss does to the attainment of our goal. How many remember that on January 5, 1946, the then West-minster Regiment (Motor) was granted the honour of mounting a Guard of Honour for the Lord Mayor of the City of West-minster (a city in its own right within the confines of

Greater London); to march through the streets of the City with fixed bayonets; and to be later dismissed on the Horse Guards Parade Ground ? No other Canadian Regiment had or has to my knowledge ever been granted this great honour.

Can anyone find any document, plaque or scroll recording this historical moment in our history? The answer is No! Two tiny items in a London newspaper, a photograph or two and a one-line item in the minutes of the City of Westminster's January 1946 meeting. This in spite of a six month search of the City of Westminster archives, B.C. House records in London and the City of Vancouver archives. Now, thirty-six years later, we must find an alternative solution to a problem that should not have happened.

Personally I can say, having attempted to record my own recollections, how time erodes memory and so many important events are lost forever. Yet, in conversation with other members at our annual do's, I know there is so

much that is not yet lost.

Perhaps, in a not too effective way, we are saying there is still time provided you sit down and think about how you might help your Executive put some flesh on the skeleton, the framework of our Regimental History so far constructed. Do it now, by letter, cassette recording, phone call, or if near enough a personal interview. Don't believe that what you have to contribute may be valueless, to the contrary it is another brick or stone in the monument to a great Regiment.

Department of National Defence Grant Approved


