

# ROYAL WESTMINSTER REGIMENT INVADES FORT LEWIS

The "Westies" like to travel in style.

And according to Master Corporal Larry Beckett, that style includes the reputation of the "best feeding regiment in the Pacific Militia Area."

In the dusty, sun-drenched forests of the U.S. Army Base at Fort Lewis, Washington, The Royal Westminster Regiment is living up to its reputation with the best bivouac area and field kitchen of all four B.C. infantry units that are just winding up ten days of intensive training at the sprawling 80,000 acre base south of Tacoma.

Seated in the Westies mess tent, with its coco matting floors and clean white oilclothed tables, Master Corporal Beckett proudly enumerated the advantages of serving with the Royal Westminsters.

"We keep food hot for soldiers coming in off field exercises with steam tables...we are the only unit that does its own baking in the field. We were lucky enough to land Corporal Mike Cameron - the best baker in Pacific Militia Area Command - as our baker.

"It's a well-known fact we serve up the best food. We came here direct from the Nanaimo military camp, and there we had regular force people sneaking into our mess lines because they liked the food better."

Beckett is a long-time Westie who is now attached to Pacific Militia Area's Food Services, as Senior Mon Commissioned Officer.

Each year B.C. reserve units travel to regular force military camps for the annual "MilCon" - Militia Concentration, at which they home up the soldierly skills they have practiced at their home armories over the year.

This year, besides the Westies 134 all ranks, Fort Lewis is playing host to Vancouver's Seaforth Highlanders, the Rocky Mountain Rangers from Kamloops, the Canadian Scottish from Victoria plus B.C. reservists belonging to medical, service and signals uits. In all, a total of just under 800 soldiers.

Beckett's team of cooks agree that it is only proper that B.C.'s senior regiment should provide the best table for its tired and hungry Westies.

Besides Beckett and Cameron, the varied menu of cold cuts and hot food is dished up every day, three times a day, by Corporals Paul Archibald, Mike Mitchell, Michelle Gaudet and Pte. Ed Selens, a Regular Force cook from the Calgary Service Battalion.

"We even had the U.S. Rangers eating here," said one of the kitchen crew.

It's only fair. For the past three nights, Ranger combat team - trained in the deadly art of infiltration - have returned in force, attempting to wipe them out and bivouac area.

"For the past three years we have trained with the Rangers," said Sgt. Major Brian Knipstrom. "They act as the opposing force for battle procedures and we have worked out a very close relationship with them."

That night the Rangers would attempt to "knock out" Westie defensive points.

First scouts would probe the regiment's forward line, locating the strong points and trying to find the nerve centre of the defense line -the command post.

Once they had been located, the Rangers would return in full force attempting to wipe them out and capture the position.

And how have the reservists stacked up against the full-time professionals? Military courtesy prevents an answer, but a Westminster rifleman did concede that 'they got some of ours, and we got some of theirs...they didn't get all they came for."

Pressed on that point Sgt. Major Knipstrom would only agree that 'they never got what they came for."

That was on Tuesday evening. The Rangers - mostly big men, silent, their faces painted with green and black camouflage cream, smiled politely hitched up their weapons and filed into the surrounding forest. They would be back later, when it got dark.

The Royal City soldiers cleaned their weapons, applied their own camouflage and set out to their forward position. The emphasis in this year's Battle School is on defensive warfare and patrolling.

Back at the kitchen, there was an invitation to dinner "roast beef and veal cutlets" - but it had to be declined. The next round of the press tour was at the positions held by Victoria's Canadian Scottish.

After that, another invitation to join the troops for dinner in the field.

"We serve up the best food in the command." a Canadian Scottish sergeant assured us solemnly - but we knew better.

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At the invitation of LCol F.T.H. Wilks, Commanding Officer, in consultation with Col W.E. McKinney CD, Honorary Colonel Mayor Tom Baker and Mrs. Baker visited the troops in the field as observers. Additional observers in the party were Mr. George Cassady from the Regimental

Council and Mrs. Cassady, Maj. W.S. Hogg CD, Regimental Council Secretary and Mrs. Hogg, Mr. J. Tutton from the New Westminster Chamber of Commerce and his son Chris, while Maj. G.W. Holling acted as a guide and Liason Officer throughout the trip to Fort Lewis.

On August 24th the group visited the Regiment, arriving at Base Camp at 0730 hrs for breakfast. After a tour of the Base facilities under canvas they were transported to see the troops in the field at the conclusion of their three day exercise, during which time the members of the Regiment were part of the defending forces against a mythical attacking enemy composed of members from Alpha Company of 2/75 Airborne Rangers, U.S. Army.

The visitors were also afforded an opportunity to fire the various weapons with which our forces are now equipped.

The group again joined the Unit for a barbecue at Base Camp in the evening, meeting the troops who were then all returned from the field. Also in attendance were the "enemy" visitors from 2/75 Rangers.
