

Ron Hurley gave his report on the Groundsheet.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REPORT

I, Col. Bradford gave a brief report on the current status of the Regiment. The main points were that the Regiment is up to strength with 135 all ranks. Parachute training is at the forefront although the aircraft availability to do the actual jumps is somewhat spotty. The Band is now turned out in completely new uniforms thanks to the efforts of many concerning the provision of funding.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the CO's report be accepted as presented.

MUSEUM COMMITTEE

Bert Hoskin gave the Museum Committee Report.

I am pleased to report that thanks to the members of the Museum Committee and to some 40 volunteers we were able to open the Museum five days per week, Monday to Friday as our contribution to Expo 86. We have reverted to our normal two days and one evening for the balance of the year to at least June 1987 thanks mainly to staffing by the Museum Committee.

We are in a financially sound position, and need only additional volunteers to bring the display of our artifacts up to a more exciting and informative layout.

Finally, with regard to the Special Museum Committee, and in accordance with its mandate, the committee reports that at the end of June or before the SMC will do everything in its power to give to the President of the Society a firm proposal concerning the future of the collection.

Bert Hoskin moved that his report be accepted as delivered. It was seconded and CARRIED

Bas Morgan requested permission to speak.

He referred to his proposal which he had forwarded to the Executive but has been tabled by them until the AGM. He was granted permission, and spoke at length. At the conclusion he moved "THAT THE MUSEUM IS PROPERLY THE HISTORY OF THE ROYAL WESTMINSTER REGIMENT AND ITS RELATIONSHIP WITH THE CITY OF NEW WESTMINSTER AND THE LOWER MAINLAND. THEREFORE WE ARE GOING TO STAY IN NEW WESTMINSTER, OUR HISTORICAL CENTRE, WHERE WE STARTED AND WHERE WE BELONG." it was seconded.

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1987

Well, the 1987 AGM is now history, "The tumult and shouting dies. The captains and the Kings depart" as I believe Kipling expressed, and the battlefield has been cleared.

There was some pretty frank and open talk between the members of the Association and the Unit, and we now can be thankful we are off to a new understanding.

With one exception, the Executive comprises our old 1946 members and we trust we will increasingly be joined by dedicated members who have served with the post war unit, for this is the only way our Association can survive, and in the long run is inevitable.

Specifically, the Active Unit now understands that there is a bond that exists between men who have been together for some six years, who have fought and in many cases died together, hence our fierce insistence on the Autonomy of the Association within the larger Regimental family. We on the other hand, time wise, must understand that to maintain continuity we must welcome their entry (new blood) into the Association. The Unit, too, recognizes that it has not been "pulling its weight" and has graciously said so.

With respect to the Museum, the Special Museum Committee has completed its report to the Museum Committee and Executive Committee. We have since June 17, 1985, searched diligently and unceasingly for a solution to our goal of ensuring in perpetuity the integrity of our collection and archives. We have not achieved our objective, and offered the following proposal to the two senior committees and obtained their approval, subject to ratification at the 1988 AGM.

- *To recognize that in view of the age, health of the Museum and Special Committees we have done all we can and cannot continue;
- *That neither the Association, nor the Unit, nor the City can in isolation find a solution to our problem;
- *That we turn over custody of the Museum to the Regiment who have guaranteed they, with the City, will actively pursue our objective;
- *To provide an initial \$350 grant to the Regiment, toward a first 1987 operating budget of \$4,000 already approved by the Museum Committee;
- *To transfer the funds remaining in the Museum chequing and savings accounts to the Association account;



*To leave long term museum planning with the Regiment and City, and to concentrate all our efforts to the Association and ALL it's members;

*To disband the Special and Museum Committees with effect April 30, 1987.

No one should, in any way, look on this as a defeat, for the major success we achieved at the Annual General Meeting 1987, was that by a overwhelming majority of our members and the gracious and considerable support by post W.W. 2 members substantiated that majority. We maintained control of the Executive, and have a new co-operative attitude on the part of the Active Unit. My thanks to all the old-timers who came back with me to re-activate the Museum Committee and carry on in spite of many obstacles.

The Winter months have seen the successful completion of a Recruit Course, a TQl Infantryman Course and an Armoured Defence Gunners Course, the latter culminating in a week long gun camp at Yakima in Washington State.

Our 106mm Anti-Tank Guns can now only be fired in the dismounted role, as the jeeps which carried them for so many years have recently been scrapped.

The jeep replacement - the Iltis - cannot be adapted to mount the 106, so for the time being - and until a new anti-tank weapon becomes available - its back to digging holes in the ground for our Armoured Defence Platoon.

We have just started a new basic para training phase for our Airborne Platoon, required annually to maintain this sub-unit at full strength. Their tactical skills will be tested to the maximum over the Easter weekend when they will be providing the "enemy" for a Battalion exercise.


The Brigade exercise will be held in Wainwright again this year from 26 June to 5 July and will take the form of a Battle School designed primarily to sharpen our "advance to contact" and attacking skills. After Wainwright the usual Summer Area Rank and Trades Schools will be held in Vernon, Chilliwack and Nanaimo.

Rumour is rife that the forthcoming Government White Paper on Defence will contain much good news for the Militia. Expansion of the Reserves may well be high on the list of priorities for the future, which if translated into reality will be most welcome and long overdue.

As one of the strongest Militia Units in Canada, with a most distinguished record of achievement in recent years in terms of such National awards as the Gzowski Trophy etc., it is hoped that we shall receive due recognition in any plans for expansion. Who knows, with support from the right quarters we might again see Royal Westminster Regiment Companies at Mission, Abbotsford and Chilliwack in the not too distant future!

Its good to hear that the Melfa Dinner is a "sell-out" this year, which augurs well for the future of the Association. We look forward to having a number of soldiers from the Battalion join you on this occasion, and also to working with your Executive on plans to celebrate our 125th Anniversary in 1988.
