PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year of our Lord 1987 has ended. Was it a good year? For the Association I would venture to say yes.

In June we established a scholarship fund of \$5,000 to be administered in perpetuity by the New Westminster Secondary School Scholarship Committee. The award will be given in the Association's name each year. The annual interest earned from the fund to be awarded to a graduating student who must have a C+ or better average, show outstanding citizenship by participation in school affairs and be proceeding to enrollment at U.B.C., S.F.U., University of Victoria., a B.C. regional College or a two term course at B.C.I.T. To start it off we gave another \$350 which was awarded to the first student in June.

The Museum has been turned over to The Royal Westminster Historical Society, which was formed in December. It is chaired by the Honourable Judge A. Stewart McMorran. We hope the Museum Artifacts and archives will be housed in a civic museum in the City of New Westminster while there are still some of us around to see it. Time will tell.

Planning is well underway for the 125th birthday-anniversary of the regiment and its antecedents. These activities are listed elsewhere.

All contributions will be tax deductible and we will issue an official receipt covering your donation.

On behalf of the directors of the Association and myself may we wish you all the very best for 1988. We hope to see you at the Melfa, May 14th and 15th, at the birthday party November 20th and at as many of the other birthday activities as you are able to attend.



The aircraft arrived in good order with plenty of assistance on board in the form of riggers and jumpmasters from the Canadian Airborne Centre and the weather was fine if a little chilly. Unfortunately, the wind was against us, gusting at speeds of up to 21 knots at the jump zone, so jumpers and spectators alike watched in frustration as the aircraft circled overhead with no chance of completing our mission. Having got the logistics right, lets hope it won't be too long before we can organize a repeat!

Winter Warfare training was also a case of the "alternate plan" being the one we eventually followed, as the Chinook helicopter than was due to transport our TQ 1 Platoon to the Chilcotins was declared unserviceable before it even got to Vancouver. This left our winter warriors battling the rain and mild temperatures in Chilliwack instead of the snow and sub-zero climate of the Northern Interior.

Now that the dates for the various "Freedoms" have been confirmed we look forward to seeing many members of the Association on these occasions and have already begun to sharpen up our parade ground skills.
