WHY THE MELFA DINNER

Each year the Westminster Regiment Association holds a reunion dinner, and the question "Why call it the Melfa Dinner" is frequently raised. Our members are drawn from the 104th, 131st, 47th Bns. as well as the first and seconds Bns. of the Westminster Regiment together with the continuing Reserve Bn. and there are other famous battles - Vimy, Cambrai Passchendale, to mention a few.

A very simple answer may be that the Melfa River Battle culmniated a long period of Regimental activity. The veterans of 1914-18, the members of the Regiment from 1922 - 1939 and the men who trained from 1939 to the Melfa River Battle in May 1943, all contributed to the success of that one action. The 1914 - 1918 war gave us the fighting 47th, establishing a history and a tradition second to none in Canadian Military History. The long years of N.P.A.M. (Non Permanent Active Militia) left us in 1939 with a nucleus of Officers and NCO's. who inculcated the earlier traditions of the Regt. within the then present Battalion, which gave it Discipline and Esprit De Corps, that intangible quality, which added to the long period of training in Canada and England, was successful in the Action of the Melfa River. This action was so important that the on-the-spot commander was awarded the highest award for Valor recognized in the British and Commonwealth Armys; the Victoria Cross was awarded to Major J. K. (Jack) Mahony.

All members of our Association should welcome the opportunity to attend our annual reunion dinner.



WESTIES RETURN TO ACTIVE SERVICE IN 1988

It began on the first week of January 1988. The 5 members of the ROYAL WESTMINSTER REGIMENT, M/CPL R. Struckoff, M/CPL B. Kelly, CPL S. McTavish, CPL P. Fiedler, PTE. R. McTavish, moved to Work Point barracks to prepare for their up-coming tour to CYPRUS. They were attached to the highly motivated, skilled and professional of professionals the 3RD Battalion P.P.C.L.I.

Two months of grueling infantry training made the modest Westminsters into a top rugged team of professional peacekeepers that could only benefit the elite P.P.C.L.I. However the Westies were only five of two full militia manned platoons that went on the tour. And as M/CPL-PTE. B. Kelly stated "Where damned proud to be the first." In fact this was the first time a militia platoon was used for such a call out.

Mid March the change of command for the Canadian Contingent is in effect. The 3RD P.P.C.L.I. has taken up the line that keeps the two warring factions (Greek & Turkish) apart. The observation posts (O.P.) are manned around the clock and the 12 hr. shifts along with the 47 degree heat take their toll.

Our job as peace keepers is not an easy one, we have to be able to do many things. Along with manning O.P.'s we fought 80 km wide brush fires; built a road (SESAME ST.), riot control and responded to 'BUG OUTS' or emergencies on the line. The stress level became quite high at times, especially when your leave was cancelled. However there were many things to do on our off time that compensated for the hard work. For example you could join the 'Ledra Palace Gardening Club' or go to AYIA NAPA (a common peasant village indigenous to that area) and bird watch. A casual conversation with the local population was another gratifying way to spend the day. "They are very friendly and cooperative, I liked them alot ... and fun to" stated M/CPL.

As the tour came to an end in September the 'Westies Five' could not help but feel sad to leave, for this was their home for half a year and they would be leaving their newly made friends behind. When asked if it was worth going, PTE. R. McTavish answered with reflection "Yup it sure was a real neat experience." As all things do, the sadness turned to happiness as they returned home to their loved ones with a medal proudly pinned to their tunic for a job well done.

Good luck to all who served and may 'The Force' be with you. Cpl. Parry Feidler.


FROM THE POST:
