

SOME THOUGHTS ON THE ASSOCIATION

There comes a time when some of us because of age or various ailments feel the time has come to turn our responsibilities over to younger, more active members. In leaving the Executive, I thought I might make some comments on the Association and its possible future.

Perhaps it is best to go back to the formation of the Association for we all know that we have had our ups and downs, and have been at odds with the current unit at times. I know many members have been bewildered as to the reasons for these little feuds.

Unknown to some, it was Lt Col Lewis of the Second Battalion who first conceived the idea of an Association, followed by Fred Simpson, and finally when we had our First President, Walter Lyle, and Secretary, Nelson Scott, that the Association began to take on real substance. During these formative years it was decided, and heartily endorsed by all, that the Association would:

- Be an autonomous organization responsible to no senior authority;
- Call members by name only, with no recognition of military rank;
- Be restricted to anyone who served in, or were attached to the Regiment during the Second World War;
- That no Honourary or Associate memberships would be allowed. With these regulations adopted, it should be clear that some friction would result. Other Associations have gone down a different path, for we find many are directly under the control of the unit or its governing body or former senior officers. That obviously was not acceptable to our membership.

Friction first surfaced through the operation of the Museum and periodic pressure from the Regiment to impose its will on the Association. was the will of the Executive and members to hold firm to its mandate. With respect to the Museum, our recommendation that our archives artifacts and history could only be achieved in perpetuity was through amalgamation with a civic museum and most of us feel this proposal still holds true. The recent changes in the composition of the Regular Force and Militia Units into a total force, the closure of military camps and buildings and the building of new, so-called "one company armouries" is disturbing to us, and does not seem to be a long term solution to our concerns. We must, however, be conscious of the problems of the Unit, for the new training standards alone leave little time for the unit to participate in museum or Association matters. Hopefully the Hon. Judge A.S.M. McMorran who is Chairman of The Historical Society of The Royal Westminster Regiment Society will find our recommendations acceptable.

But what about the future of the Association itself? It seems appropriate in forecasting a scenario to first review the past history of our associations dating back to the 1918 return of the 47th Pn., who

formed the first real Association. Over the years the membership dwindled and were not replaced by new members from the active 1918 to 1939 Militia units. Inevitably, the 47th Bn. Association just ran down.

To me it appears that the same thing is happening to our Association, for few new members are coming forward from the current Militia Regiment, except perhaps for a small number of the more senior ranks. Obviously, if the Regiment chooses to do so they can take over control of the Association Executive at some future Annual Meeting and election of Directors.

Personally I welcome it, for the demise of the Association is inevitable if the Royal Westminster Association is to continue to function as a Society. The only problem I can foresee is the disposal of our financial assets.

I have researched our position pretty carefully, and the most favourable forecast as I see it is that (with a mean age of 71 or 72 for our Second World War veterans) our operation of the Association would end about 1994 in any case. Some loyal oldtimers might ask "Do we just fade away?"

There is something worth considering for such persons. I have always been impressed with The Hon Sir Winston Spencer Churchill Society who meet once per year for a "No Host" luncheon in his memory. At times if a special visitor is in B.C. they may also host an informal dinner, eg. the visit of Lady Soames. This small society always includes in the luncheon a "Key Note" speaker with an intimate knowledge of that great statesman. The Society provides any travel and lecture costs which are often refused. That loose association imposes no major involvement on any one person. I personally like the idea of getting together once a year, and to have a gifted key note speaker gives the luncheon real prestige.

I do not wish to pursue this proposal further unless there is sound evidence that sufficient members agree with my assessment of the situation. Perhaps those who feel as I do would wish to let the Groundsheet know how they feel about the future.

Finally, I do regret how my intense pride in The Westminster Regiment (Motor), our Regiment, has made me so domineering and dogmatic whenever a real or imagined threat to our organization appeared over the years.
