The 18th annual picnic and meeting of Branch #3 ("D" Company) of the Royal Westminster Regiment Association was held on Sunday, August 4th, 1991, at Circle 6 Ranch, Columbia Valley, Chilliwack.

While the turnout was a smaller one, the delightful weather and warm welcome were vintage and the entire afternoon most enjoyable. Fifty-eight members and guests attended and a bevy of younger generation chefs including D'Arcy-Jane Henderson, Jeff Britton and Marion Soutar produced many excellent steaks accompanied by salad and baked potatoes. The latter have been supplied for years by Bruce and Alice Eaton and good they were, too. Bernie Doughton played the pipes for us as an aid to digestion (Scots wha hae, that is) and song, clarinet and piano music by John and Mary Young was a delightful addition. Tune up your pipes, lads and lasses, the sing-along can be a great deal better. Thank you for your participation, Elsie, and thanks to you Sam, for your great idea. Ann (Soutar) Britton and Big Sam graced our gathering most of the afternoon. Most distant visitor was Doris Moore, McLure, B.C., and youngest, Amanda Guliker at nearly eight months.

At approximately 3:30 p.m., the branch meeting was held with twenty two members and guests in attendance and President John McConnell in the chair. He reported the addition to the Flask of the names of Copper Newitt and John Clifford. A bugler, Joe Hobek, was expected. Bruce Eaton was again named Parade O.C. Ruth Newitt was welcomed as the Branch's new Historian and committee member, with much of Copper's memorabilia of the Regiment to be displayed, hopefully, at future picnics. The chefs were heartily thanked for the excellence of the cookery.

The Secretary read a card of thanks for flowers from Ruth Newitt who expressed Copper's great love for his Branch and Association. A letter was read from Ron Hurley enclosing the generous donation of \$50.00 and expressing his regrets on being unable to attend the picnic. The financial statement was then presented showing a balance on hand of \$1,215.99, still showing the effects of Norm McAskill's most generous donation.

Colonel White reported on the training program at Fort Lewis which had included range work and forced marches. Live fire training had been carried out at the computer - controlled camp at Yakima and the Airborne Platoon had had an active year with jump sessions at Abbotsford, in Alberta and at home. Jumps at Reno and Hawaii were scheduled for the future. "B" Company was established successfully at Abbotsford with a complement ranging between 20 and 30. He also reported that four cadet corps were operating in Abbotsford, Sumas and New Westminster.

Chuck Smithers, President of the Regimental Association, reported that there were 135 life members and 113 annual members. Out of a total membership of 438, 190 received the Groundsheet without paying dues. 45% of the annual dues - paying members were post war. He reported the obituaries of M.C.L. Adair, Merv. Sands, Bill Barrett, Bill Robertson and Mary Parr-Pearson.

Lynn Edmonds reported that she had collected over \$200.00 in Regimental Association dues at the picnic and was thanked for her good efforts.

Bruce Eaton advised that he had visited Bert Hoskin in hospital on Saturday and had found him in good spirits but very restricted in activity. He reported that Ron Hurley had developed shingles and was awaiting the results of further tests. Walter Lyle advised that he had seen Norm McAskill in hospital recently and that Norm had not recognized him and had also not known Doug Glenn when visited.

Chuck Smithers passed on Doug Glenn's regrets for being unable to attend the picnic. Curley Janelle and Bill Jasman were reported to be ill or in hospital. Bas Morgan was reported to have been selected by the Minister of Veterans Affairs to be a member of a committee of five who would visit Canadian grave sites in Italy and n/w Europe in the 1995 VE Day Memorial observances.

The plight of our members who were unwell or in hospital was regretted by all. Messages will be going out to them at an early date.

A vote of thanks to Marion, Sam and Elsie for their kind hospitality was heartily approved.

The Flask of Remembrance was then circulated. Generous donations totalling \$382.00 were received.

President John referred to the appointment of Ruth Newitt as Branch Historian and committee member and stated that Copper had accumulated photos and documents relating to the Regiment which would be of interest to all. He recalled that Ruth was a member of the original committee which had consisted of D'Arcy and Elsie Baldwin, Leo and Daisy Wright, Copper and herself, and which had been responsible for establishing the annual picnic in 1973.

The current slate of officers, John McConnell, President, Ed Shannon, 1st Vice-President and Hugh Shannon, Secretary-Treasurer, were returned by acclamation.

The parade and ceremony then followed shortly before 5:00 p.m., and the Roll of Honour was called. As our bugler was unfortunately held up by traffic, the stand-by tape was utilized, with some difficulty. This resulted in the regrettable loss of the Retreat call and reduced the Last Post to its Reveille conclusion. During the playing of the 23rd Psalm the colours were lowered and presented by the colour party of Sam Soutar, Dick and Ed Shannon. Then the familiar lament, "Flowers of the Forest" was piped by Bernie Doughton as an appropriate end to the ceremony.

The parade was then dismissed "until next year". Next picnic date will be Sunday, August 2nd, 1992.

One spring day in 1915, Lieut. Ingraham (Gitz) Rice of Montreal and Sgt. Edward (Red) Rowland of London, England, were sitting in the Café de la Paix, rue de la Gare, Armentieres, in northern France, trying to dream up a new song for that night's troop concert.

Rice, 24, had enlisted on the first day of war in August, 1914, and was commissioned in the 5th Bty., CFA. But soon after he reached France he was made a full-time entertainer, working with Rowland, 27, a British music hall actor who had enlisted in the Royal Army Service Corps at war outbreak but had been assigned to entertainment for the duration.

On a battered piano in little more than half an hour, Rowland wrote the words and Rice the music for Mademoiselle from Armentieres destined to rank behind only It's a Long Way to Tipperary as the most

popular song of WW I.

The subject of the ditty was present when Rowland and Rice cobbled it together from an old marching song British soldiers had sung in the Crimean and Napoleonic wars and likely before that. Marie Lecocq was a 24-year-old waitress in the Café de la Paix and already noted by Commonwealth troops for her vivacity and her chastity.

Rowland's original opening verse went:

Mademoiselle from Armentieres, parlez-vous, Mademoiselle from Armentieres, parlez-vous? Mademoiselle from Armentieres

She's never been kissed for 14 years,

Inky, dinky, parlez-vous.

The song was an instant hit. It was soon being sung wherever Commonwealth troops congregated, though soldiers almost invariably and ungraciously lengthened the unkissed time to 40 instead of 14 years. Rowland's original lyrics comprised only four verses but before long the troops had added hundreds of their own, some far less decorous than Rowland's.

Neither Rowland nor Rice apparently ever considered copyrighting their song, and never made a penny out of it. They spent the rest of the war entertaining the troops in France, Belgium, and England. In the winter of 1915–16 alone, they entertained more than 55,000 men behind the front line.

Rice was born in New Glasgow, N.S., and moved to Montreal with his family at an early age. He later worked with his father and brother, Charles, in the family photographic studio, but Rice's avocation was Montreal amateur theatricals. An accomplished pianist, during and after the war he composed many popular songs, including Dear Old Pal of Mine, I Want To Go Home, and Take Me Back to the Land of Promise. The latter was used by the Canadian Dumbells concert party as the opening chorus in one of their shows in France. He died in New York in 1947 at 56.

Rowland went back to the musical halls after the war and eventually became manager of a London moviehouse. He died in his home in Surrey in 1946, age 59.

As for Mademoiselle from Armentieres, she became Madame Merceau, and later a grandmother, and died in 1945 at 55.
