



Reports back from Westies training with the 2 Bn PPCLI are that our soldiers are doing well except for MCpl Buryniuk who unfortunately broke his leg during training at Fort Ord in the USA. He is now on the mend and will be part of the rear party at Winnipeg on stand by as a replacement.

We had an excellent Annual Regimental Mess Dinner on the 20 Feb 93. The Lt Governor of British Columbia was our guest of honour and this was a great tribute for the Regiment. Recently we were down in Yakima, Washington during the school break in March. We did some training on machine guns, anti-tank weapons and threw grenades. The last couple of days we conducted live fire defensive shooting at the computer controlled targets on the Multipurpose Range Complex. We then finished with a 15km march back to our bivouac site which was completed in just over 2 hours.

Kerry McPhedran, a freelance reporter was with us in Yakima and lived with us in the field under canvas. She is a niece of Lt Col G.C. Corbould. I believe that she was suitably impressed with us. Her article will appear in the Western Living magazine probably for the June or July issue.

Still going after 50 years

This is a true story of a World War II veteran and a wrist watch.

Tommy Smith enlisted in September 30, 1939, just a few weeks after war was declared. He spent that winter in barracks in the old Vancouver Hotel and then later in the spring of 1940 in Dundurn, Sask.

From there he was sent to Camp Borden until he was shipped overseas in 1941, stationed at Aldershot until 1942 when Westminster Regiment from New Westminster went into the front lines and action.

During the First World War this Regiment was known as The 47 and that is why all the Westminster Regimental Numbers start with 47. Tommy's number was K47403.

While he was in England and was playing ball, he broke his watch, and being a Signalar, he really needed a watch, so he wrote home to his parents in Climax, Sask, just mentioning to them he had broken his watch. His parents placed an order for a watch from Eaton's catalogue in Winnipeg, to be sent overseas.

When Tominy did receive this watch he was in action in the front lines. The Corporal with the Postal services remarked to him that he hoped Tommy would be luckier than two other members of the Regiment that had received watches and now both were killed in action.

Needless to say he started wearing the watch right away and has worn it for 50 years. The original strap was leather, and over the years has had several straps, had it cleaned and repaired

- both of these costing more than the original price which was \$29.95. On the face of it is the words Solar, Aqua.

Tommy's folks never saw the watch until he returned home after three years in action.

Needless to say, everyone is happy that Tommy's luck held out and me especially, as we were married in February, 1948 and have had 44 years together and have one son Neil and Judy, daughter-in-law, Lisa, granddaughter, two grandsons, Killian, Lochlahon in Edmonton.

Tommy worked at various jobs in the building trade in the Vancouver area, later taking a course in Steam Engineering and ended up as Third Class Engineer.

We came to Kamloops in November 1962, as Tommy was employed with DND at Mount Lolo Radar Base, retiring in July 1975.

Tommy just celebrated his 82nd birthday and is still very active as he has a big yard with a hedge to keep trimmed. He is a bowler during the winter and member of several senior groups.
