



110 Members enjoyed the 93 Melfa including the golf and brunch.



Major Conradi reported that 140 soldiers paraded recently and that two rotations in Croatia had been done. The regular forces were being amalgamated with the militia. 3rd Battalion, P.P.C.L.I., had been transferred to Camp Chilliwack and had been

allotted an anti-tank role. He advised that the outlook was optimistic and that the changes were being absorbed efficiently.

The Flask of Remembrance was circulated and generous contributions of \$285.00 were received. The current slate of officers consisting of John McConnell, President, Ed Shannon, Vice President, Lyn Edmonds, Secretary, Ruth Newitt, Historian, and Hugh Shannon, Treasurer, were elected by acclamation.

The parade then fell in under O.C. Bruce Eaton. The Roll of Honour was called and the well known extract from "For the Fallen" given by Flag Officer Sam Soutar. Last Post was blown by Bugler Dan McDermid, followed by a hymn and the lament "Flowers of the Forest" by Piper Bernie Doughton.

On the upper grounds the parade was reconvened and mementos were presented to Sam and Marion, a regimental flag by Major Conradi, a suitable plaque by Jerry Gangur for the Regimental Association and a vase and flowers by John McConnell for Branch #3, together with sincere expressions of thanks for the unforgettable two-decade long hospitality of Circle 6 Ranch and our gracious hosts there.

Lulu left name on map

There's no doubt the honorable gentleman was smitten.

The enchanting young thing who also sailed the West Coast more than 100 years ago left a lasting impression on the chivalrous colonel,

and her name on the map. Lulu Island, upon which Richmond is situated, nestles in the arms of the Fraser.

Perhaps that is why, in 1861, the then Lt. Governor, Colonel Richard Clement Moody, named the seagirt expanse after Lulu Sweet.

Lulu was an English actress visiting the colonies with the first theatrical troupe to play

here.

As the Chief Commissioner of Land and Works, and a person prone to exploit his position, he felt free to stamp her name for posterity.

A history book includes this note on the Colonel, who commanded a detachment of Royal Engineers: "Moody's charm was expansive as was his chivalry (he named Lulu Island after a visiting actress whose performance took his fancy) ..."

We may assume that the role she took on stage held no portent for him.

She played Lucrezia Borgia.

The origin of the name Richmond is much more prosaic,

In 1861, Hugh McRoberts emigrated from Australia and established Richmond Farm.

The name was chosen by one of his daughters in remembrance of a favorite place back home.

Whatever Lulu wants, Lulu gets...Or was that Lola? No mind, it proves that the first commanding officer of the R.C.E. detachment in 1861 and whose name we perpetuate (today the chain unbroken as the Royal Westminster Regiment) surveyed more than the currents of the mighty Fraser or the dangerous Eddies round Queensbourough's Banks.

I just received my copy of the Groundsheet out here in Croatia. Its always good to keep in touch with the home unit.

During this six month peace keeping tour, I have witnessed a few situations that were very similar to those described in Col. Hoskins book; "Sometimes with Laughter". It would seem that although weapons and technology have changed since WWII, the soldiers haven't.

I have included a copy of 2PPCLI's "Sandbag" Newsletter. The cover photograph features Canada's External Affairs Minister. Barbara MacDougal and page 3 features a poem: "Just a Common Soldier"
