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EDITOR'S CORNER _____ "REFLECTIONS ON A RIVER"

My requests, for personal memories of the Melfa 1944 drew a complete blank with but one exception and that from my Platoon Officer Art Miller. I thought I would express some of my own. They are most certainly not of any more importance than others but it is what I recall and because I was a section leader in Art's 12 Platoon, I will try not to be a mirror image of his remarks. I apologise to Art for downsizing his remarks but I know he realizes the limited space we have available. Personally I believe we all shared some very common feelings - apprehension, curiosity, adrenalin, fear & hope. We all realized that 'The Old Foot Slogger's' area of battle rarely exceeded 100 yards in all directions. Even The Coy Cmdrs knowledge was far removed from the Pin Pushers in the rear with their colorful maps. This is not a condemnation, simply a fact. Among my many memories is the fact that The Battle of The Melfa did not end on 24th of May. May 25th saw us replicating a W.W. 1 type of advance - four companies in line abreast advancing through a field of poppies. We struggled forward with C.Coy 12 Platoon at the apex of this unusual formation approx. 1,000 yds north of the original Melfa Bridgehead. We were stopped cold under a mammoth & murderous 'Stonk'. Our 75 Hawkins Grenades - (hardly capable of blowing a tire off a bike), resulted in a handful of dry scorched earth. Our casualties mounted alarmingly and under a merciless searing sun we took this pounding for 7 hours; The Irish Regt were suffering similar difficulties. Perhaps, among a host of memories, is that of the gallantry of 'C' Sqdn, The B.C. Dragoons. With little or no cogent order or direction they set forth with 9 tanks to relieve the battered Infantry from their long ordeal. In minutes 7 Tanks were hit and six were ablaze and one appeared to be disabled. I shall never forget the one tank that got within a few feet of our slit trenches before it too was torched...a Tankman, clothing on fire, was hanging from the turret ring; Pte C.L. Lewis of 12 Pltn reached him first and lowered him to the ground. He hollered repeatedly "Get Clear, Get Clear, It's going to Blow' It did indeed Blow & several of our men were wounded from the exploding Tank Hulk. I, with others, checked the severly burnt Tank Man. He was quiet now, horribly burned and unconscious. I checked his Dog Tags; He was a Sgt Singbeil and I knew him from Militia Days. I had last seen him at Militia Camp in Vernon in June 1939. What a strange twist of fate - I had started my Military life in C Sqdn B.C.D's in Penticton and had been among the first of underaged volunteers for Bridge Guard Duty on 26 Aug, 1939 at Pr. George B.C., still a member of C Sqdn B.C.D., we stayed there until mid Dec. then were told to come home. Had the B.C.D's mobilized I would have stayed there. We did not go home and managed to be convincing enough to be accepted by The Westminster Regt. (M.G.) That gallant Sgt survived his terrible burns ony to die from them in Jan. 1945. Fate moves in many ways - I have many memories but on this 50th Anniversary I salute The B.C.D's and especially their 'C' Sqdn and the brave Sqt Singbeil. Fate dealt a rotten hand to C.L. Lewis who had got him free from his tank. He was killed in The Gothic Line. Memories like this are everlasting.

MEMORIES OF THE MELFA 1944 by H.A. (Art) Miller ____

I was a platoon Lt with Major Ian Douglas's C Coy on that unforgettable Melfa Battle 24/25 May 1944 in which "A" Coy Major Jack Mahony won the Victoria Cross. 50 years is a long time but some incidents are indelibly etched in my mind.....

I recall being at the start line before crossing when heavy machine gun fire forced us to hit the ground — I can still hear the bullets thudding into a tree, where I sought refuge ... fortunately for the platoon their aim was high and we suffered no casualties at this point ... I remember that we had lost signals communication and were forced to use personnel runners between our platoon and Coy H.Q. I could see the enemy tanks on the high north banks of the Melfa: They were very close and had we continued on this line of march — it would surely have been suicidal. A somewhat amusing incident (albeit serious), took place at this spot. Our Q.M. Sgt arrived with a piat gun and assuming the prone position attempted to engage the enemy tank — he lost sighting from this position and he stood up and placed the piat gun in the crook of nearby apple tree. His view improved, only to note the rumbling panther rolling towards him and firing rapidly. He left the piat dangling in the tree and beat a hasty retreat to his pltn. I returned to my 12 platoon and was informed to move from this ominous diaster area to the center and proceed along A Coy's designated bridgehead across the river. The Melfa seemed to be a rather insignificant river approx 80 yds wide. I thought that the water level was quite shallow (as it was in most spots) but noticed a pool at our crossing spot. I went forward with confidence only to sink up to my armpits. One of my Sgts was toting extra 2 in mortar shells adding an additional 90 lbs. above his normal equipment. Inadvertently he plunged into this pacific looking pool and burdened by the extra weight went right to the bottom and was soon thrashing desparately to avoid drowning ... I rushed to his aid - got him back on his feet and we scrambled up the steep embankment without further incidents. The first thing I saw was the stolid figure of Jack Mahony strolling nonchantly as if nothing was happening. He was wounded, many of his men dead or wounded. He was pleased to have extra men to help hold his hard won bridgehead. Meanwhile the vastly superior enemy armour was literally pouring every type of shot and shell in an unrelenting downpour on to the men holding on to this vital bridgehead. Jack Mahony's V.C. for this action served to remind me these 50 years later we were fortunate to have had such capable leadership and such courageous troops - Thank You Art Miller.

D-DAY DODGERS DESERVE SALUTE, FORMER ENEMY SAYS _____

Halifax - With so much glory going to D-Day — the Allied landing in Normandy — on this 50th anniversary year, Bob Dietz thinks Canadians who fought in Italy aren't getting the attention they deserve.

He finds that a shame because the Germans found Canadians in Italy a remarkably tough enemy.

Dietz should know. He was a German artillery officer, directing howitzer fire on the Allies in Italian places such as Rimini, as well as on the Russian and German fronts.

Now 69 and still carrying a heavy accent from his home in Rhine-Mosel, Dietz emigrated to Canada in 1951 and joined the Canadian navy as a musician with the Stadacona Band.

He went on to become an artist and art-gallery owner. Now retired, he wrote an autobiography, Oath of Allegiance, about the horrors of war, and recently finished a play, Gunner Schmidt at the Crossroads, based on the book.

Veterans of the Italian campaign have long grumbled that the bloody mountain battles they endured have received scant attention because D-Day got it all.

Dietz says it started with Lady Astor's comment at the time that they were sunning themselves in Italy while boys were dying on the Normany beaches.

But at Monte Cassino alone, almost 105,000 Allied soldiers and 80,000 Germans died.

With proud irony, veterans of Italy then started calling themselves the D-Day Dodgers.

Dietz, who recalls his German general commenting on the toughness of Canadian and Gurkha soldiers, says the Dodgers saved D-Day.

"My point is the Italian campaign is just as important as D-Day. The fact is they kept two German armies tied up — over 20 divisions with over 300,000 soldiers.

"If they had been free at the landing, can you imagine? D-Day may have become another Dieppe disaster. That is why I'm saying don't forget the D-Day Dodgers."

The Veterans Affairs Department is organizing a pilgrimage for Italy veterans in May, similar to one being held for France on the D-Day anniversary June 6.
