We can regard 1994 as a year of progress and a year of considerable accomplishment.

Funds raised in support of the Future Fund exceed \$35,000. This is an impressive reflection of the willingness of our members to support a worthy cause. The casino license we were hoping to get this year will, with good fortune be granted in 1995. Our fundraising goal remains to raise \$100,000 for the Future Fund and \$10,000 in support of the Royal Westminster Regiment Historical Society.

Melfa - 94 was a magnificent success and was no doubt enjoyed by all who attended. We commemorated the 50th anniversary of the battle at Melfa River and paid tribute to the Regiment wherein we invited the general public to join us in honoring the achievements of our two warriors who served with our regiment and were awarded the Victoria Cross. Our regiment was honored this year by the appointment of The Duke of Westminster, Lieutenant Colonel Gerald Grosvenor, as Colonelin-Chief of the regiment. The unit paraded in September in the armoury before a packed house in honor of this appointment.

Our board of directors consists of two of eight elected members coming from the serving regiment. Our nominating committee will attempt to repeat the ratio and almost certainly include the names of post war members on the nominating slate. The torch will slowly be past on to the next generation.

As you have already been informed, the decision to disband the band of the regiment was taken in October of this year. We know that your letters objecting to this action have been received by the Minister of National Defense and the heat is on. Will the decision be reversed? We will wait and see.

The Junior Ranks Christmas Dinner was a dinner second to none. The tradition of Officers and Sen Nco's serving the men dinner was followed, <u>BUT</u> this year a special program was planned. L/ Sgt Len Bailey, M.M. of the Snipers and Scout Platoon (WWII) was invited to attend. He was not told why. He and his wife Flora came for dinner; from Nanaimo, and the surprise was that the annual trophy awarded at the Xmas Turkey shoot was to be renamed the L/Sgt Len Bailey, M.M. Trophy. After a short introduction to Len's wartime service by President Gangur, Len said a few words and presented the trophy to the winner.

Your executive will continue to work and build for the future. We ask that you plan to come to Melfa-95. We have a special program planned which will be outlined elsewhere in the Groundsheet.

Warning Order - Melfa 95

On May 7, 1945, preparations for further action were being made by the Westminster Regiment (M), when on the same evening the official announcement of the cessation of hostilities reached the battalion.

During the months of March, April & May, the Westminster Regiment had fought and advanced through many centres in Holland and at wars end was still in Holland.

It is our plan to invite those Dutch citizens who lived in the areas that our Regiment fought through and who may now be living in Canada, to our Annual Dinner. For this reason we ask that you make a special effort to attend as almost certainly, stories are to be told and heard.

While details are still being fined tuned, we can tell you that this will be a special dinner and one that you will remember. Cost of the dinner will be \$30. per person and it will be held in the Armoury.

Dates: May 19-20-21 with the dinner being held on the 20th.

Chairman for the Melfa Dinner will be Nelson Scott. More details to be announced in the Melfa issue of our Groundsheet.

The past year has been full of events and experiences, with the Regiment breaking new ground in many areas. The New Year arrived with word that Her Majesty had approved our request to name His Grace the Duke of Westminster, as our first Colonel-in-Chief. This is only the second time that a non-royal has received such an appointment, and is due in large part to the unflagging efforts of Colonel Bill Mckinney to make his vision a reality.

Following on the heels of this good news was an announcement which shook the Unit to the core — the loss of our Airborne Platoon. Due to force restructuring and internal army politics, the Airborne platoons of all tasked western Canadian Militia units were disbanded. The loss was most keenly felt by the young troopers in the Platoon itself, but all members of the Regiment were upset by the cut. As its last official duty, the Platoon provided an excellent quarterguard for the Commander of Land Forces at the annual Regimental Dinner on 17 February 94.

Spring and summer saw the renovation project near—completion, with nearly one million dollars being spent to bring the building's aging facilities up to par. Included in the work was a sprinkler system for fire protection, a complete rewiring of all electrical systems, comprehensive renovations to the basement offices—and Q.M., and a new ventilation system for the Range. The controls—for all these systems are housed in an underground addition to the Armory, located inside the compound.

Summer also saw the first new arrivals from 3 PPCLI, who are to work with us in the "10/90 Battalion" project. The plan is for the Patricia's to provide a cadre of full-time NCO's and Officers who will assume the burden of training and administering the troops, leaving the Westies free to concentrate on leadership and soldier skills. Another benefit of this system is the wealth of new equipment at our disposal. Our first demonstration of how well this new organization will work came when a platoon-size course was run in August to qualify soldiers on the TOW (Tube-Launched, Optically-Track ed, Wire-guided) anti-armour missile system.

The Fall training season was barely underway when word reached us that our Band was to be dissolved. With only five day's notice, Area HQ ordered the Band to cease all training and turn over all its equipment. A last-minute reprieve allowed us to have music on Remembrance Day, but future operations are in grave jeopardy. The local community has generated a great deal of support aimed at having this decision reversed, but for now the fate of our Band is in doubt.

In summary, the year of 1994 produced positive results in training and facilities, but was a black year for the Regimental spirit. It is to be hoped that 1995 will hold more positive news in store for the Band and other Regimental interests.

R.A. Lee Lieutenant Colonel Commanding Officer Over the past twelve months we have witnessed many changes in The Royal Westminster Regiment. How have these changes affected the Regiment and where are we now?

Up to February 1994 we trained and maintained an infantry company, one parachute qualified platoon, built up another infantry platoon in the Fraser Valley and supported ourselves with all the necessary personnel and equipment. Since February '94 we have become part of Western Canada's first Total Force Infantry Battalion (TFIB). responsibilities are now to train and maintain one infantry company as B Coy 3 Bn PPCLI (Third Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry) and to provide on fully trained TOW platoon (Tube Launched Optically Tracked Wire command link guided missile system). We are supported by 3 Bn PPCLI, this includes regular force personnel and equipment. I do not hesitate in saying that the TFIB organization is for the good of the Regiment. Regular force personnel working with the RWR are dedicated and professional. Equipment supplies are now better maintained and more properly managed. Our units' resources are now more efficient and focused on training the infantry and TOW. Recruiting, which is so vital to our survival is being approached with renewed enthusiasm, however, one regrettable casualty has been the band.

Training this year is focused on the "Advance". Sept 94 to Dec 94 saw training at the individual level. This was to standardize skills in weapons handling, navigation and personal battle craft. skills training culminated in a 'soldier skills evaluation' conducted by district HQ. Jan '95 has been allotted for section training. In addition to Thursday evenings, section commanders were allowed a full day on Jan 7 to sort out their sections. Section level training has included movement across ground, use of terrain and formations on the move, section level battle procedure & patrolling doctrine. Section level quick attacks and patrolling were practiced in Ft. Lewis, Wash during the weekend 20-22 Jan. February will be used for Platoon training. This training will include movement across ground, platoon level attacks and platoon size fighting patrols. We hope to have each platoon outfitted with a support weapons det for this phase of training. Platoon tactics will be practiced in Ft. Lewis, WA during the weekend of 24-26 Feb. March will see the culmination of this training in live fire and company level operations. A week long exercise is to be held in Ft. Lewis, Wa during the period 17-26 Mar. This exercise will include range training for personal weapons as well as platoon support weapons. There will be ranges for practicing team and section live fire quick attacks which should also allow the use of grenades. In April the regular force members of 3 Bn PPCLI presently attached to us will be departing to Dundurn, SASK. Once there they will be conducting selection training for soldiers who have applied for peacekeeping duty in the former Yugoslavia.

In light of the recent decision to disband the Airborne Regiment we could expect more changes to the role and taskings of The Royal Westminster Regiment and our TFIB. The Regiment has maintained its' unique identity and unit pride throughout the last 12 months of change. I am confident that we will continue to grow and strengthen throughout the changes yet to come.

Recently Cpl L. Hellewell and myself returned to Canada from one six month Peacekeeping tour of Bosnia. As part of Op Cavalier Rote III, we belonged to the Strathcona Battle Group. Lanny was with the Strats TOW Troop and I was with B Coy of 1 PPCLI from Calgary. We were based in Camp Visoko 30 km northwest of Sarajevo.

Arriving in Bosnia was definitely a culture shock. The landscape disclosed the effects of war. Bombed out pockmarked buildings, ruined churches and mosques, numerous cemeteries and police/military checkpoints along major roads. The destruction we saw in 1994 Bosnia was reminiscent of what the veteran Westies must have seen 50 years earlier in Europe.

The two factions we came in contact with on a daily basis were the HVO (Croatians) and the BiH (Muslims). For the most part they seemed to tolerate the UN presence, although at times depending on the political climate they would try and hamper our movements.

During the beginning of our tour the weather was extremely hot and humid. This made our job hard. Constructing O.P.s, filling and moving sandbags was arduous work, especially in temperatures of 40 degrees centigrade. Depending on the threat level we had to wear our flak vests and helmets while carrying out our tasks. This made life truly miserable for us.


Boredom was a constant of the tour. Long hours manning the O.P.s, radio watch and calling in shot reps became routine and boring. Receiving letters and care packages from family and friends really boosted morale. After mail call whether you got mail that day or not everything was shared.

The most interesting part of the tour was the foot patrols to the Croatian-Muslim front lines. We got the chance to meet face to face with the soldiers manning the trench systems and bunkers. Our task was to ensure both sides were not violating any of the ceasefire conditions. Turkish coffee and "Schlive' was always offered to us by the soldiers who looked just as bored as us having to man O.P.s.

At times we were either ticked off, hot, cold, tired, excited or just plain sick of Bosnia. We all missed home and felt the tour couldn't end fast enough. By the end of September the weather began to turn wet and cold. Our track vehicles turned the roads up to the O.P.s into a quagmire of mud.

Compared to the Westie Vets who fought in Europe long ago, we had it easy, our tour was not years, only six months.

Lanny and I are proud and honored that we had the opportunity to represent our Regiment in Bosnia. We learned a lot about life and ourselves.
