EDITOR'S CORNER

May 8, 1945 - May 8, 1995 - 50th Anniversary Victory in Europe

Victory. Ah Sweet Victory At Last. Not so sweet for some, but a giant relief to all Canadians who served - many for over 6 years. The famed D-Day Dodgers i.e. all those 1st Cdn Corps Vets who had managed to survive and been transferred from The Italian Area in time to play a major rol in The Liberation of Holland. This latter action brought Unconditional surrender for all German troops in Holland May 5, 1945. The Dutch folk are eternally grateful to all Canadians who served in the starving North East sector of Holland. The Westies & 5th Armoured Divplayed a major role in these last hectic battles. The famed 1st Cdn Infantry & 5th Armd Div were to at last experience the joy & euphoria of being Liberators - some-thing they had not known from Sicily July 1943 & departure from Italy in Feb 1945. The D-Day Dodgers were delighted, at last, to share in the fruits of Victory. Personally I was unable to share the Holland experience. On 14 Dec 1944 along the Naviglio Canal, my war ended abruptly. On 15 Dec 1944 I became comatose & came out of it, to the sound of bells, on Christmas Day, 1944, in Can Gen Hosp at Jesi..... On 8 May 1945 all the Bells in England were pealing the good new - Watford Hosp no exception. Everyone who could headed for London...We returned to Watford Townshipwhere we enjoyed hours of singing to the piano, now moved outdoors; we shared joy & laughter and sadness...All in all, it was not a bad day to mark the end of such vicious and mindless brutality that had permeated teh world for so many years. I had survied & it was not yet time for me to consider that this replication of 1914-18 had been as mythical a "The Great War -The War to end all Wars. Sad to relate that despite our collective sacrifices, we were unable to reduce Military Actions - over 100 plus ongoing to date in 1995. WE Gave It Our Best Effort. So to all D Dogers I say GRAZIE, SALUTI, BUONA FORTUNA - YOU WERE MAGNIFICENT.....

PRESIDENT'S REPORTANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - MARCH 95

If one word could be used to describe the status of year 1994-95 it would have to be achievement. In May of 94 your association paid tribute to the regiment and invited the general public to join us for an evening at the Royal Towers hotel. Over 300 citizens responded to this invitation. Speakers from the association included **Jimmy Oldfield** and **Vernon Ardagh**. The well known war correspondent **Peter Stursberg** joined us and was able to provide actual sound footage of the artillery barrage which preceded the offensive of which the Battle of Melfa was part. Our annual dinner, was well attended, especially by serving members of our regiment. The Royal Westminster Regiment Historical Society was a great supporter of ours during this weekend, both morally and financially.

Our Future Fund has deposited an additional \$25,000.00 with Vancouver Foundation, bringing our total up to \$35,000.00. Our goal remains to raise a total of \$110,000.00. We thank all who have donated and we want you to know that our efforts will continue in 1995.

Production of the Groundsheet continues to be a high priority. Along with the upgrading of the production process, we have also expanded the distribution of the newsletter. During the last two decades, we distributed the Groundsheet to members of the serving battalion by leaving copies in the respective messes, in the hope that soldiers would pick up a copy. This was a hit and miss proposition as we never could be sure that all serving members would receive

a copy of the Groundsheet. The last three issues of the Groundsheet have been mailed directly to the serving members residence. Feed back from the regiment with regard to this move has been most positive. This move increases production costs and postage expenses, but your executive feels that benefits of this move justify the additional costs.

In May of 95, we will see some of our members make the trip to Holland to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Victory in Europe. We hope to receive reports from those who do go to Holland for this purpose. In Canada, during this same period, we will have ceremonies taking place in Vancouver and Matsqui and we have been asked to take part in ceremonies in Lynden, Wash.

We did receive some bad news to do with the serving battalion. As most of you know, the regimental band has been disbanded. This was a most unfortunate development and we hope that the decision is not final. The regiment also lost its role to provide an airborne platoon in support of the regular force.

Cannot end my report without thanking members of the executive, directors and members of the active battalion for their support in the last 12 months. Would like to thank **Chuck Smithers, Nelson Scott** and **Ron Hurley** for the extra effort given to the association. From the regiment, must thank the RSM CWO **Chuck Mckinnon** for his enthusiasm and support given to me personally this past year. His cooperation and drive is what resulted in the regiment inviting **Len Bailey** to the annual Xmas dinner.

The association will continue to evolve and do what it can to perpetuate the memory and contributions of those who served in War and Peace.

THE REGIMENT

The ongoing situation in the former Yugoslavia has resulted in Canada renewing its commitment to peacekeeping activities there. As part of this commitment, over thirty Westies have volunteered to augment the Regular Force units there. Starting with the selection training in late April, our soldiers will move on to receive further trades training, such as APC driver or anti-tank gunner, over the early Summer. July, August and September will see our troops working with their assigned battalions in collective training, before their scheduled deployment in October.

A very significant feature of this deployment is that the Regiment will be sending a formed platoon, as opposed to individual augmentees who would be scattered throughout another battalion. Our anti-armour Platoon (known as T.O.W. Platoon after the weapon system they use - the TOW missile) has a Regular Force Captain, Warrant Officer and Sgt., who joined us last Summer. The other platoon members are all Westies. TOW Platoon enjoys very high morale and aspires to be "the" platoon to belong to. This sense of dedication and esprit de corps is demonstrated by their volunteering en masse to undertake United Nations duty together. Our best wishes go out to all Westies as they prepare to go overseas to the war-ravaged lands of the former Yugoslavia.

I hope to meet more of you at the upcoming Melfa celebrations. Until we meet again, let me wish you good health and Godspeed.

Aldergrove Company

There have been a number of significant changes to the Aldergrove Company since the start of the 1994-95 training year. If you have not already heard, 3PPCLI 10-90 battalion has cast its shadow over BC District and as a consequence it designated the New Westminster company of the RWR it B Coy. The Aldergrove Company has henceforth, been named C-Coy and comprises 6 Platoon and the battalions Anti-Armour Platoon. Company HQ serves mainly in the supervisory role for them as 6 Coy, 3PPCLI, and the Anti-Armour Platoon has not integrated their training with the rifle platoons

beyond the level of the individual skills training. Also, AAP training has been limited mainly to the Armoury in New Westmr.

With the arrival of 3PPCLI has also brought a number of experienced full time soldiers to the ORBAT of the Company. We now have personnel available to us qualified in such areas as Small Arms, Small Arms Coaching, Rappelmaster, Mountain Operations and TOW Section Commander. Starting with the Anti Armour Platoon. Capt Zilkens is a TOW trained platoon commander who arrived last fall after a six month UN peacekeeping tour of the former Yugoslavia with the PPCLI. The Anti-Armour Platoon Warrant is WO Estery A.S. and Sergeant is Sgt Thom L. Both are PPCLIs and possess a wealth of experience each. They certainly have a serious desire to accomplish great deeds and see the Total Force concept through to a successful reality. They are cooperative and most welcomed by all Westies. 6 Platoon has the benefit of a full time Platoon 2ic., Sgt McKenzie F., arrived last year too and his impact is most notable in the preparedness of the troops for each session of training.

Perhaps the most significant change in the Company has been the retirement of Major Gerry Potter. A longtime dedicated Westie, his enthusiasm and energy belied his age. Fifty-five snuck up to us all in mid-December 94 when he accomplished his last duties with the Company. In honour of his service and dedication the Company held a party for him and gave him a large wall mirror with the names of past and present B Coy personnel under the badge of The Regiment, all nicely engraved in the glass. Judging by the emotion displayed, it was evident to me that Major Potter will miss his men as much as they will miss him. His replacement is Capt Sandor Cseienyi, and ex-R22R with fifteen years of regular service. He now makes his home in the Vancouver area and plans to spend many years as a Westie.
