

A British Columbian Airborne Chapter comes to a Close



The interior of the of the C-130 Hercules drowns out the nervous conversation of the "cherry" jumpers and focuses the thoughts of the experienced. The aircraft from CFB Edmonton 435 Transport Squadron bucks and pitches as it heads toward Drop Zone (DZ) Abbotsford, B.C. The Jump Masters (JM) Sgt's John McLaren and Perry Fiedler are awash in the red glow of the interior lights. The "ONE MINUTE" is given. The jumpers strain to remain standing with full kit and await the next command. "STAND - BY"! Tense attention is focused on the jump lights. The light goes green. Like a rifle shot, the command "GO" is given. The grate and snap of static lines the shuffling of feet and equipment is heard. Each jumper JAB'S and exits into the night. The paratroopers are snapped and buffeted by the 120 mph prop blast. The distinct odor of spent JP-4 fuel wafts through their nostrils. Each jumper counts and waits to see his olive drab bundle blossom into a perfect chute. "CHECK CANOPY"! Another parachute descent has been completed by members of the Airborne platoon of The Royal Westminster Regiment.

Form 1985 to 1993, FMC HQ (Army Headquarters, St Hubert, Que.) had tasked four Militia units: Le Regiment du Saguenay (Chicoutimi, Que.), The Queens Own Rifles of Canada (Toronto, Ont.), The Loyal Edmonton Regiment (Edmonton, Alta.), and the Royal Westminster Regiment (New Westminster, B.C.), to provide and train an Airborne Platoon to augment The Canadian Airborne Regiment.

For the first couple of years, the members of these militia units, such as The Royal New Westminster Regiment (R WESTMR R), were entirely reliant on their Regular force brethren to support this task. During the short eight year tasking members of these platoons participated in: Regimental and Commando level exercises, the Airborne Indoctrination Course (AIC), and Tactical Airlift School Taskings.

In keeping with the standards of the Airborne Family, members of the R WESTMR R Airborne Platoon attended a minimum of three Regimental/Commando exercises, passed the AIC, and served a minimum of one year in the platoon. These requirements qualified them to wear the silver clasp to their parachutist wings and the maroon beret.

The Airborne platoon of the R WESTMR R had to overcome many obstacles in the beginning: getting authority to be issued the parasmocks, and the maroon berets (many members purchased their own); registering new DZ's; getting an airplane for a jump; learning about Canadian Airborne Standard Operating Procedures; arranging for JM's, Parachute Instructors, Parachute Riggers and DZ Controllers for each descent; the B.C. weather; getting the entire platoon para - refreshed, on a weekend, at the Canadian Airborne Centre (CABC) in Edmonton.

The platoon like all units had to rely on its leadership to help it develop into a team. Warrant Officer Rob Gilmour, Sgt's Tom Duke, Terry Killam, John McLaren, Perry Fiedler and others helped the platoon become the AIRBORNE WESTIES. The platoon developed into a quiet professional organization with a sharp focus on the task at hand. This quality of training led to the Airborne platoon becoming a strong attraction for new recruits to the R WESTMR R, as well as, a home for many ex-regulars and exprofessional soldiers from other nations (2 Para, Royal Marines, South African Defence Force and the US Rangers). Regular Support Staff Officer's Captain's Don Haisell, Rob McIlroy, and Simon Rushen (all members of the Royal Canadian Regiment) provided the main administrative thrust for the platoon to become self sufficient (except for air crews, aircraft and riggers the platoon did complete some parachute descents with all of its own resources. This included conducting para-refresher in New Westminster, B.C.).

The R WESTMR R Airborne Platoon achieved some milestones which are worthy of mention: 21 para drops in 1 year; para dropped into Hawaii via C-141 Starlifter aircraft; para dropped into Reno, Nevada via Sky crane helicopter; at one time the R WESTMR R had at least 94 parachutists qualified (40 paratroopers current); 3 qualified JM's; and 50% of the platoon had served in the former Yugoslavia.

During the Airborne Platoon's existence in the Westie's it would not have survived without the strong support of the following units and personnel: 435 Transport Squadron; Canadian Airborne Centre; Canadian Forces Parachute Depot; Canadian Forces Aerial Training & Development School; The Canadian Airborne Regiment; Colonel Holmes and LCol Nette; and the unit's own Regular Support Staff.

CITIZENS OF PUTTEN, HOLLAND REMEMBERS WESTMINTER'S

Quote from page 192 Westminster War Diary. "Many heavy battles were fought on April 17th (1945) and it would be desirable to record them all in detail. However, the nature of the mobile operations such as these prohibit the recording of anything more than sketchy outlines. Only brief reference can be made to C Company's "battle of the road blocks" from Barneveld to Voorthuizen and B Company's struggles south of Barneveld and their difficult night operation in Voorthuizen. In the course of these actions the Battalion lost three killed in action - Cpl C.L. Pewtress, Pte J. Wakula and Pte. F.L. Waters."

President Jerry Gangur received a telephone call followed by a letter from Kay Lemay, the sister of Charlie Pewtress. This is his summary of the communications. Kay attended a plaque unveiling, in Putten, and the invitation of the local community, honoring the above Westies and Pte John Wallace of the 8th Princess Hussars (also killed in this action).

<u>Flash back.</u> On Sunday October 1st, 1944 in reprisal for an attack by the resistance in an incident where a German officer and a couple of soldiers were killed, German troops, assisted by the Dutch SS, arrested 661 men and after releasing 59, sent the remainder to the concentration camp and only 49 came home after the liberation. Others died while trying to escape. It is recorded that 13 men jumped out of the train on their way to Neuengamme.

On April 17, 1945, the Westminters noted above were KIA. On April 18 the Germans withdrew from Putten. On the morning of April 18, Mr. Bennemeer found the body of Pte J. Wakula. I was told that the Canadians were buried and their graves tended until the War Graves Commission moved the remains to a War Graves Cemetery.

Some years after the wars end, The Foundation "October 44" was formed among its' many objectives was to establish a Memorial Hall to honor those victims of October 1944 and those who died in the liberation of the Netherlands. A plaque, with the names of the soldiers of the Westminster Regiment (M) is located in the memory room.

Kay was invited to the 50th anniversary celebration marking the Liberation of Holland and while their she met two other Westminsters, Art Fisher of Ottawa and Len Welch of Peterborough. The group of Canadians were escorted down a quiet lane in Putten where the four men were killed and there the Burgameister unveiled a plaque on which their named are engraved.

Kay related to me numerous incidents in which the Dutch community show their gratitude towards Canadians. Listening to her talk about how the Dutch remember caused a lump to form in my throat. Holland is a nation that is grateful for Canada's war effort and the personal sacrifices of its' soldiers and they show it in so many ways.

The "October 44" Foundation has not appealed for donations, but while in Putten, Kay Lemay did learn that some of the work on the Memorial has been put on hold due to lack of funds.
