Commanding Officer's Report

1995 was a year of many changes for the Regiment. It was also a year that cast a shadow on the future of the Battalion and on the future of Canada's Militia overall.

One aspect of the Battalion that escaped significant change in 1995 was the Unit organization. The 180 plus members on strength (as of 05 May 95) were distributed amongst Bn HQ, two rifle coys and a recruit coy. On top of this the community still had the loyal service of our Regimental Band. Funding was cut for the Band in 1994. Despite this obstacle our band members have volunteered and have played at many occasions including: a Spring/Valentine concert, the Hyack Parade, the Military Ball, a Drum-Head memorial service, Remembrance Day, and they finished the year with a Christmas concert. We must continue to strive for means to pay these fine young men and women until our Band is officially re-established!

Unit training also adjusted to this year of change. As the year began the Battalion continued with training in individual battle skills and in collective offensive operations. As a 10/90 (Regular / Reserve ratio)Bn, we were tasked to provide a dismounted Rifle Coy and a TOW Anti-Armour Pl to 3PPCLI. Early in the year a moral-boosting call for volunteers to serve with Canada's UN force in Croatia came, and with it a heightened sense of urgency for the battle skills preparations necessary for selection. As the selection date approached, collective trg was cancelled due to early deployment of several key personnel and much of our equipment. We were able to get a good week of solid trg in prior to these cancellations by participating in the Spring Gun Camp at Yakima, Wash.

Our Anti-Armour Pl set a benchmark as the first ever Canadian Militia Combat Support Pl selected in its entirety for UN duty! However, in keeping with the year's spirit of change, at Summer's end, the government announced a suspension of further Canadian deployments to this planned mission. We await further developments.

In the Fall of '95, the Bn hosted several civilian organizations in a one-evening/day earthquake response trg ex. This trg received television media coverage. There is little doubt that the civilians who participated recognized the value of having a Reserve Force ready for such an emergency.

The Colonel-in-Chief visited the unit twice during 1995 and His Grace was most pleased both times with the trg he saw and the hospitality shown him by the Regiment. Colonel Grosvenor plans to visit the Regiment again this year on 24 Feb 96. He will also attend the Annual Officers Mess Dinner to be held on the same evening.

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Commanding Officer's Report cont

The decision to close Camp Chilliwack and move 3PPCLI to Edmonton has been made. As CFB CHWK was our support base this will have a profound effect on the unit. What the move of 3 PPCLI to Edmonton will mean to the Westies is not clear since most of our stores, vehicles and weapons now belong to 3PPCLI. One thing that is clear though is that our Bn will lose about ten officers and senior NCOs, that have been integrated into our Battalion in Edmonton.

Through-out this year of change, and expectedly more so in the near future, this support provided to the Unit by the Honorary Officers, the Regimental Senate, and the Regimental Association has been most appreciated and needed. This includes a special thank-you to the association for their Christmas gift to the Unit, and for being there as an organization dedicated to the continuance of the memory of the Unit come what may!

Scholarship Revisited

Historical. Approximately some 25 years ago the association set aside funds for the purpose of providing a scholarship to some deserving student. Eligible candidates had to be a relative of a former serving or current serving member. A serving member was also eligible. Funds set aside for this purpose were administered by Trustees, who were members of the association. A scholarship selection committee was existed, also comprised of members of our association.

As time went by, it seemed that the number of applicants for the scholarship was diminishing and getting a scholarship committee together proved to be most difficult and there was the matter of administrating the funds. For these reasons, and possibly others, it was decided (about 10 years ago) that the funds sufficient to ensure an annual scholarship of approximately \$500. should be deposited with the New Westminster Secondary School. Selection of the candidate would be restricted to a student attending New Westminster Secondary School and the selection of the candidate would be the responsibility of the NWSS. The terms of reference currently do not require the recipient be a relative of a serving or former serving member of the regiment. It should be noted that NWSS is most cooperative and invites a member of our association to make the annual presentation.

Purpose. While sitting in the audience waiting to be called up to award the scholarship this past year, the president started to think about the original intent of the scholarship and the fact that only students attending the NWSS were eligible receive the award. Additionally, the president, this past year had to reply to three applicants who were relatives of former serving members and inform them that they were not eligible to apply for the scholarship. This matter was raised at an executive meeting and a committee was struck and asked to report back with recommendations.

Committee Recommendations.

1. A Scholarship sponsored by the Association should parallel the original terms of reference. That is eligible candidates are to be : a) a relative of a serving or former serving member b) a serving member

2. Funds to administer the scholarship should be transferred to a third party. As Vancouver Foundation currently administers the funds accumulated in our Future Fund, this would be an appropriate third party administrator.

3. Scholarship Selection Committee. A scholarship committee comprised of association members and members of the regimental family be established. It is envisioned that individuals

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occupying positions in the Regimental family would serve as members. For example, the pres of the association, the president of the Junior Ranks Club, the RSM, the president of the WO & Sen NCOs Mess, a representative from the cadet corps etc. The actual structure of a committee could be decided by the executive. What is important is that such a committee would have a constant source of members. Changes, if made would commence in 1996-76 academic year.

Annual General Meeting Item

You are advised that this topic will be raised at AGM 96 and it is expected that a motion in support of the Committee recommendations will be proposed. We ask you to consider the view outlined and let us know your position. If a change is in the making, we need to know that our decision has the support of our members.
