ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING MARCH 21, 1996

President's	Report
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This will be the last of three annual reports I have had the honor and pleasure to present to the association. A few months into my first term as president, it was clear that there were three areas that required special attention and that addressing them might take longer than one year. The membership at large gave me three years to perform the tasks, I'd quietly assigned to myself. May I summarize these points.

My predecessor, Chuck Smithers, left office with money in the bank, but the concern was that funds accumulated by one executive group could quickly be used up entirely by another executive group and then the drive to accumulate funds would have to be started all over again. How could our funds be accumulated and set aside for future decades? The solution was the establishment of our Future Fund. Money accumulated in this fund would be turned over to a third party administrator/manager and annually our association would receive a cheque based on the income earned in the fund. The fund administered by Vancouver Foundation is referred to as The Royal Westminster Regiment Association Endowment Fund. At the time of this report, we have approximately \$50,000 deposited or pending deposit in the endowment fund. Every executive, from this date forward will receive an income, thanks to the generosity of our current members. Our goal was and is to raise \$100,000 for the fund and \$10,000 for the museum, which is now the responsibility of The Royal Westminster Regiment Historical Society. A second area of concern came to the surface when Art Miller phoned me just prior to Melfa 93, wanting to know a member's phone number. After calling a few local executive members and being informed that the telephone number for this member was unknown to them, the determination to collect

every members' home phone number was made. Today we have tel numbers recorded for more than 90% of our members. If you are one of the fellows that hasn't forwarded your tel number to us, do so today. The third task was to encourage active participation of the serving battalion and post WW2 members in the affairs of the association. The serving battalion was encouraged to prepare articles for publication in the Groundsheet and as you know from the last three issues, the members have come through in grand style. We have the commitment to receive articles for every future issue of the newsletter. Included in the drive for participation was the need to have past or current serving members serve as **directors**. We have succeeded and once again, you will see post WW2 members and current serving members on our board of directors. To all those who have agreed to serve as directors, I say welcome, congratulations and thank you for stepping forward.

Melfa 95 was a celebration marking the end of WW2. While we were marking this event here in New Westminster, some of our members journeyed to Holland and were fortunate to experience the emotional expression of a grateful nation giving thanks to Canada. While talking to the veterans on their return to New Westminster, it seems that they were all impressed with the genuine participation of the youth of Holland in these celebrations and their knowledge of the contribution made by Canada in the Liberation of Holland.

Future Fund. There is more to be done and would have been done, but for the energy and time required in planning and having the 50th anniversaries in 1994 (Battle Melfa) and 1995 (end of WW2). To those that inquired, let me assure you my determination to reach the goals set remains as firm as ever.

Governments throughout the world are wrestling with budgets and expenditures related to their armed forces. Canada is no different and in this light, we did receive some disturbing news regarding the future status of our regiment. What changes will be imposed and when they will be implemented remains to be seen. If you feel that Canada should continue to maintain a strong Reserve Army, than take the time to tell your member of parliament of you feelings. You may influence the course of future events.

In my concluding remarks, may I express a few personal remarks. First, I will recall with pride the years of service as your president, particularly since I was the first non WW2 veteran to serve in this office. This fact alone influenced me and kept me highly motivated during the last three years. As many of you know, command of the regiment was also an honor accorded me and as proud as I was of that appointment, it did not compare to the pride I felt on my first remembrance day parade when the veterans, after a brief discussion in front of the armoury, informed me that it was the president who would lead them in the march past. My back and shoulders ached for days after as I slowly recovered from the added exertion required on that occasion. To all, it must be said that without the help, cooperation and support of the members of the executive, nothing that has been achieved over the last three years would have been possible. To all outside the executive and board of directors who gave support, I say thanks and well done.

Finally, the nominating committee has done a magnificent job in presenting a slate of officers for the next executive and to them we wish good health and good fortune.



ARMOURY 100 YEARS OLD

Yes, that building on Queens Avenue celebrated its' 100th birthday on March 27, 1996.

The Armoury has been the focal point, for the community of New Westminster over this period of time and has been used for many different events to assist and develop the entity of New Westminster. The Armoury has been a Refugee Centre, after the Great Fire of New Westminster in 1895, and again during the Frasser Valley Floods of 1948; The Armoury floor hass also provided the needed space for the conduct of Special Dinners. This has included The Exhibition Dinner of 1929. The Armouries was used because The Exhibition Buildings had burned in a fire. The guest of honour was Sir Winston Churchill. who was in New Westminster at that time to open The 1929 Exhibition.; Being a Military building, the Armoury has also hosted important military men such as, Field Marshall Montgomery, Lcol Cecil Meritt, V.C. & our previous Chief of Defence Stall Gen deChastilien, to name but a few; The Armoury has also accommodated many local events, Red Cross Blood Drive, Amateur Radio Club Swap meets, Hyack Festival Tea, and the Large Potato Exhibit of 1930. The Armoury is the location where the first Basketball game took place in British Columbia. The lacrosse coach was using Basketball as a way to prepare and train his players for the game of Lacrosse; finally the Armoury has provided a location for the Militia to train and prepare for the defence of our Country.

As citizens pass the Armoury, and walk along the Westminster Quay, they might note the presence of cannon. The 24 pound brass howitzers along the Quay are from the days of The Seymour Artillery Battery. The large black 64 pound naval gun that sits on the lawn along Queens Avenue is from the days of the No. 1 Company Garrison Artillery. The gun room, which currently housed the Royal Westminster Regiment Museum has gun ports which still face south toward the Fraser River.

Facts About the Armoury

- Construction commenced 1863. Armoury occupied 1886.
- Wood A-Frame structure.
- Main floor consist of 3" x 10" planks laid on edge & covered by black top.
- Largest free-standing frame structure in B.C.
- 1930's basement dug out and cement foundations poured
- 1995 Received \$1,000,000.00 face lift
