This is my first opportunity of the year to address the membership, so Happy New Year to all. I would like to review some of our activities over the last several years.

When Jerry Gangur became President, he said he had a project that he wanted to get started. That project was the "Future Fund." He said if we were to raise 100,000. dollars and deposit it with Vancouver Foundation, it would provide a perpetual income and that would ensure the ongoing livelihood of the Association. This happened to come along somewhat unexpectedly and events had to be coordinated with ceremonies in the East. Our Eastern neighbours were helpful in many ways, including financially. Despite all the problems that had to be dealt with, we managed to put on a damn good show. We did not get the best of cooperation from all the Regimental Family, and I will always be disappointed with that, but we reached our objective just like the good old Regiment did in those great Wars we participated in!!

I almost overlooked that last year (1997) when we also celebrated the 50th anniversary of this Association. I want to express thanks and my greatest Regards to those older Comrades that persevered over the years and kept the Regimental Association alive and on the move. The Groundsheet has been a wonderful means of keeping contact with old comrades and friends over the years. A decision was made a few years ago to allocate four pages of the Groundsheet to members of the serving battalion. Did You Know That? - submitted by Capt. C. Mackinson, CD.

Our Regimental cap badge was designed by LCol F.J. Simpson VD, when he was the Regimental Adjutant. LCol Simpson was the Commanding Officer of the Westminster Regiment from 1934-38. In 1936, the unit name was changed to Westminster Regiment MG (Machine Gun).

The cap badge design (and title) was approved in 1924. The detail of the cap badge is significant and explained as follows:

The setting sun of the West - indicates the unit's geographical location. The maple leaf - the unit's Canadian heritage and the unit's affiliation to the 47th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force. The crown - indicating the unit's recognition of its loyalty to the monarchy. The beaver - the industrious application of hard work which reflected the nature of the community in which the members had come from. The title 'Royal' was approved and added in 1967.

It is believed that LCol Simpson's sister was in possession of the colonel's original sketches. However, no documents on the cap badge were found in LCol Simpson's papers.

The official design, of the cap badge, has 15 points on the setting sun (demi-sun) like our current brass cap badge. However, by design or error, the Regimental Colour has 17 points on the demi-sun. It is tradition, in the Regiment that all Regimental officers cap badges also have 17 points.

Our musueum is in possesion of two of the cap badge samples that the colonel had designed. Note that one cap badge actually has 19 points and the other cap badge 17 points, as well as, the image of the 4th Div. patch (WWI) in place of the beaver. A diligent search through archives might reveal some more information. Anyone having more formation on our cap badge please contact the museum.

Christmas - Westies Dig Deep

The Regiment finds time to serve the local community at Christmas. This years efforts were concentrated on two fronts: the Santa Fox food drive and the New Westminster Christmas Bureau.

2nd Lt. Ted McNabb (2IC Adm Coy) delivered over 1000 pounds of food donated by unit members through Sgt Izzard RQMS) to the Coquitlam depot for the Santa Fox Christmas Food drive. Capt. MacKinnon (Trg O) started our participation in this cause, and for the second consecutive year the Westies have been the greatest individual sponsor contributing to this drive!

In the week ending December 19th the New Westminster Christmas Bureau had the armoury floor covered three feet deep with food, gifts and workers preparing hampers for some of the less fortunate families of New Westminster. The unit helped this community effort by providing, on short notice, the armoury and personnel throughout the week. Lt McBryan (Asst. Adjt.) recognized the daunting task of delivering the small mountain of material forming on the parade square. He sought and received approval from Brigade HQ to offer unit transport "assistance" in delivering "some" of the hampers. Sgt Kelly (unit transport NCO) organized the volunteer effort of several drivers from the Regiment with almost no notice (Brigade approval took some time). Patricia Anderson, coordinator for the Christmas Bureau wrote in appreciation of our efforts, saying:

"The heroes of the day were the members of The Royal Westminster Regiment who stepped in at the eleventh hour and performed the overwhelming task of delivering, in pouring rain, over 400 hampers. I was astonished at their forthrightness in approaching the job, when the rest of us could not imagine the task completed, these trained professionals dove in and carried the job to its successful conclusion."

What a totally unexpected honor to be selected as the representative of The Royal Westminster Regiment to attend the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge and I wish to thank all of you, especially Col. McKinney and Nelson Scott.

On arrival at Vancouver airport met Smokey Smith, V.C. and he introduced me to the Seaforth representative, Bill Worton and to the Merchant Navy man, Dick Wilson who will be part of the delegation to Vimy. A 4 hr 50 minute flight by air Canada and we were met by the ladies who will be our guides etc. (from the Veterans Affairs Dept.). Our luggage was tagged in bright red and in French read "Ancient Combatents" which we got a kick out of. The girls looked after the luggage and bundled us into taxis to go to the Hotel Elgin.

Nice rooms my roommate was **Bud Tapley** from N.B., had been in first Div in Italy with Carlton & York Regiment.

Next day, April 5th had a get acquainted session also historical briefing on Vimy and other pilgrimage sites. The at 13:30 hr. a visit to Canada's War Museum, which we all enjoyed, then on to Rideau Hall for a reception by the Governor General Romeo LeBlanc and Mrs. LeBlanc with lots of drinks and food and a visit to certain areas of Rideau Hall where we were allowed to see. Enjoyed the green houses as they produce all the flowers for Rideau Hall & grounds.

Along with us on this trip was a youth from each province and the Yukon. BC's

representative was 16 year old **Nathan Leggat** from Langley and they were such a fine group, they looked so nice in suits & ties and the girls in their best dresses.

Along with us too were six first world war one veterans with relatives or caretakers to look after them in their wheelchairs. The young people also helped on many, many occasions during the 10 days.

On Sunday April 6, breakfast was at 6:00am - and by 9:30 we were in the air in the D.N.D. aircraft on our way to France. They really fed us a lot on the plane also all the drinks you could wan. The Gov General came around and shook hands willl each of us, he make a complete tour of the plane and made every one so welcome. We arrived at Lille at 2200 hrs. then by bus to our nearby hotel only a mile or so from the airport.

Monday April 7, a briefing for all of us by the advance party. There are 3 coaches hired for our transportation, they are from England also English drivers as they are cheaper than the French ones. So we were off to see Lille for a few hours on our own and the French girls still wear **very** short skirts!!!

Tuesday, April 8th we had a lovely 3 course lunch at Hotel, then by bus to Vimy Ridge and memorial to put us in the picture for the ceremony next day. Had a vist to the Canadian tunnels that had been dug in preparation for the Vimy Offensive - with guides, otherwise we would have soon been lost..... Wed., April 9th was the most


unforgettable. Eighty years ago today was the Battle of Vimy Ridge. Weather was real warm & sunny, ideal day....French honor guards lined up on the lawn and the crowd all over the embankment around the Vimy Memorial. Our G.G. gave his speech followed by the French, then our 104 yr. old Vet got up to the rostrum and recited the poem They shall not grow old. Then to the wreath laying, it was a real honor to represent The Royal Westminster Regiment at such a ceremony.

Reception later in a huge tent attended by all Vets, guides etc., once again food and lots to drink. Our honor guard at the ceremony was very sharp and impressive commanded by a Major Haisal, It was a day to make us proud to be Canadians and one remembered for the rest of our lives.

On Thursday April 10th it was a ceremony at the Newfoundland memorial at their famous battleground at Beaumont Hamel. We walked all over the area of battle and its a wonder even 37 survived the day of July 1st, 1919. Later we toured the Somme area and to the huge British French brick memorial over 100 feet high that like Vimy, has thousands of names on it. Then on to another of Canada's war effort at Courcelette where they are still digging up unexploded shells after 80 years.

On Friday it was to Belgium and the Ypres salient, Ypres was the only part of Belgium not captured by the Germans in W.W. I Our first stop was at Vancouver Corner in St. Julian where the Canadians in W.W. 1 held the line against the German gas attacks. Then on to Passchendale memorial --what a cool day today. Then on to the largest British Empire 3 war graves cemetary at Tyne Cot where there are 37,000 names enscribed including British, Canadians, Australians, New Zealanders and South African casualties....Left Lille at 1205

local time and flew back to Canada, stopping off at Quebec City to let the band off --then on to Ottawa --trying -- to snow..Hotel overnight then home to Vancouver by 10:20am. Good to be home but a most memorable journey

Constitutional Amendments - Housekeeping items

Constitutions, being living documents, must be amended from time to time. Your board of directors is recommending the following changes to our constitution. In accordance with our constitution, notice of presentation of two motions to amend the constitution at the Annual General Meeting - 1998 is being served.

Current Wording

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Proposed Amendment No. 1

Part two - Membership

Para 6. The annual dues of the Society for its various categories shall be as follows:

- (a) General Membership \$ 10.00 (b) First World War Veterans Free
- (c) Serving Members of the Regiment 10.00
- (d) Life Memberships 50.00
 - (i) Life membership funds shall be vested in a fund, the income only from such fund may be transferred to general income.
 - (ii) Such fund to be administered by the Trustees and such fund to be separate.

Change Para. 6 (a), (b), (c) and (d) to read:

Para. 6. The annual dues of the Society for its categories shall be as follows:

(a) General Membership	\$15.00
(b) First World War Veterans	Free
(c) Serving Members of the Regiment	15.00
(d) Life Memberships	100.00

Note: Para. 6 (d) (i) and (ii) are to be deleted.

Current Wording

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Proposed amendment No. 2

Part 10 - Trust Account

Para. 24.

- The directors of the Society shall be empowered to set up and administer The Royal Westminster Regiment Association Trust Fund or its predecessor.
- (2) Three (3) trustees shall be appointed by the Directors with full signatory powers for this fund. These Trustees, commencing with 1953 be appointed for the following terms of office; one for five (5) years, one for three (3) years and one for two years. All subsequent appointments of Trustees to be for a period of five (5) years.
- (3) No expenditures shall be made from this fund without the full authorization by signature of all three (3) Trustees.
- (4) In case of retirement or death of any Trustee, the Directors are empowered to appoint a replacement for the unexpired portion of the term vacated.

Delete para. 24 in its entirety and replace it with the following wording.

Part 10 - Endowment Fund

Para. 24.

- The Directors of the Society shall be empowered to set up an endowment fund and appoint a trustee to administer such a fund. The fund is to be known as The Royal Westminster Regiment Association Endowment Fund.
- (2) Donations to the fund can be made to the Royal Westminster Regiment Association or directly to the Trustee.
- (3) The annual income received from this fund may be deposited in the association's general account.
