

Privates Burden & Solanas arrived off leave late, as a result up before the Company Commander. He asked Burden the reason for his late arrival and after listening, went on to explained why you had to be on time. He kept saying, do you understand me. A speech Burden would voice his agreement. He got 5 days pay loss & 5 days confined to barracks. When Andy Solonas, nick named Ugh came up. His answer to all questions was ugh. Finally company CO bawled the hell out of him. As I escorted them out, Solanas grins at Burden and says, you lost money & time. I am just a big dumb Indian all I got was hell.

Got your letter & to late about election. I do remember Jerry Brisbin. Bribin & Hinkle & I were in a pup tent & just got back from the line. .... We were playing poker & Jerry went broke & said to me, I'll give you this ring & I want it back when I get 500 lire. I said to Jerry, you keep the ring & he said no, you take it. So we played only a few hands & we had to go out to the front for the night. As he went out the door he said, don't let anybody have that ring. I said OK & he later went out & got killed. So I still have his ring. I have it in safe locker in the bank. He was a real nice guy. I often think of those times. Sniper Bailey (Len) & the water truck & remember when he rescued the little boy in no man's land and he got shoes for him. I got an army suit made. And when his grandparents came & took him away, he cried and said I don't want to go with those old people. I am a Canadian....We were stationed first, close to the Gurks, a good outfit, we used to go over to visit them. They were the ones that captured Casino....Often wonder why we sailed to North Africa for two days... As for sniper Bailey, he sure did a good job for the Westministers. I have some photos of him & our truck driver Gallop. Towards the last I was out wounded & way in a hotel which served sergeants. I also have photo of Hains & Oldfield..... I was on run To Czech. And helped drive truck to Czechoslovakia. Please excuse the writing I am 85 years old & been alone for over 20 years.....Did you ever hear of the young fellow Canadian who jumped up on a German tank & threw a grenade in at the Melfa (that was Cpl Cullen & he received the MM for his efforts....Ed.)... We had a bad afternoon & had to back off. C Company came in and took over & in the morning in came a new German truck with a full meal and a keg of beer. One guy told me this was the best meal he had, lot better than ours....So all the best, I remember you also Freddie West. You lived close to me in Annable after the war.

Another letter...... Lilian and I happily celebrating 60 years of married life.... Having just received the Groundsheet, I was interested in page 9, particularly the PIG CHASE. In my case, it happened in Holland, not Italy. .... Arriving in Holland, 17 platoon took over a front line position from the second front fellows. It was a small house close up to a high dike that had a road running along its top. ... The Sarge showing us the position was so different from ones from the 1<sup>st</sup> or 5<sup>th</sup> Divs, just as the food, equipment, supplies and ammo had no relation to what we were accustomed to. First we were ankle deep in spent 303 cartridges. When I commented on what a hot spot this must be, the Sarge replied no, really quiet! How come all the spent cartridges? Oh, that's from our hymn of hate each night and morning!! What the HELL IS A HYMN OF HATE? Each night and morning Jerry opens up with all he has so we reply. Do you have many casualties I asked? Hell no Sarge replied, both of us just fire into the air as the dikes stop us from hitting each other!! No shortage of ammo here!! .... The road that I mentioned on top of the dike had a lovely shell hole right in the centre and in no time us D Day Doggers tunneled into it from our side then tunneled out to the other side clearing a nice peek hole with a removable sod to cover it from Jerry in the daytime. Ahead lay about 50 feet of nice flat land and beyond was a cannel roughly 100 feet wide, on Jerry's side another nice dike about 15 feet high, the same as ours. Our first intense observation revealed flat peaceful looking land, with but one lone bit of life in sight, a lovely fat little porker, nibbling away in happy contentment and on OUR SIDE. JUST WAIT TILL DARK LITTLE PIGGY. So once night settled in, half of 17 platoon over the dike and after the little piggy. He stood out as plain as could be, a lovely pink porker! Soon we discovered it was one thing to catch the little devil and another thing to hang on to him. He would struggle and squirm right out of your arms. This damn chase got wilder and wilder. We ran harder and the pig grew faster and faster able to turn on a dime and give us six cents change. How long this circus went on as we done our best to encircle and trap him. At last with a new burst of speed that porker broke through our lines with me in hot pursuit. Suddenly, in crushing smashing collision, I was knocked bruised battered and breathless to the ground. Regaining my breath, I yelled, YOU STUPID BASTARD, WATCH WHERE YOU'RE GOING. Heard a big deep drawn in breath then a voice replying MINE GOTT IN HEMIL!! And I sat facing the biggest damn Jerry I had ever seen. Silence reigned supreme for about ten seconds then he burst out with the biggest heartiest laugh one could imagine. Being unarmed and a lot smaller than him, I too started to laugh. This all ended with us helping each other up. We were weak from laughing. The mixed force of would be hunters shook hands and each retreated. I think both sides often recounted THAT NIGHT IN ACTION BETWEEN THE DIKES IN HOLLAND....
