The Royal Westminster Regiment Association Bursary New Westminster Secondary School

The John Ford family started a bursary for a student at the New Westminster Secondary School. The Association continues to provide funding for this bursary. The criteria are as follows; "Candidates should be currently serving as a member of The Royal Westminster Regiment or The Royal Westminster Cadet Corps or a descendant of anyone who served with the regiment (son, daughter, grandchild, brother, or sister), and must have maintained a C+ average or better. The candidates will demonstrate outstanding citizenship (particularly in school affairs) and will be enrolling at a BC university, regional college, or a diploma (2 year) course at BCIT."

The awards ceremony for the 2022-23 school year was held at the school on 13 June 2023. This year's recipient was Alvin Won, who unfortunately was away on the awards night. In a letter to the President, he advises that he has been accepted by the Royal Military College.

At the same awards ceremony, the President, Bill White also made presentations on behalf of the Major Ian Douglas Bursary.

Melfa Golf Tournament





REMEMBERING OUR 47TH BATTALION VETERANS

Over the past few years, the Canadian community has been observing various centennial and significant events relating to World War One. Besides our attendance at Remembrance Day services across Canada, Canadians have been travelling to Europe to visit military cemeteries and battlefield sites; the significant one being Vimy Ridge. And while most of our war dead are memorialized in France, Belgium and England, there are many places where our soldiers are remembered by family and communities.

completely intact and is excellent way to walk around the city. And we strolled the very wide walkway we came across the "Wee Church on the Wall", Saint Augustine's Anglican Church. The doors were open, so we ambled in to explore. And on the wall was a memorial featuring sailors and soldiers from the parish "who gave their lives for King and Country in the Great War". As I read the list I saw "William M. Davin Pte Canadians" listed: a Westie from Londonderry.

While traveling around the island of Ireland (Éire) we drove 2,500 kilometres through some 18 counties of both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. Both Judy and I have significant Irish heritage; three of my grandparents were Irish with the fourth being a Scot. And in several villages and towns we would see their cenotaphs.

After exploring Northern Ireland, we stopped at Londonderry before we swung back to the Republic. An interesting feature of Londonderry, commonly called Derry, is it is a walled city; the walls date from the early 17th century and circle the city at 1½ kms in circumference. The wall is

629592 Private William Maurice DAVIN enlisted on 3 November 1915 with the 47th Battalion in New Westminster, age 22.

He was the son of George Davin of Londonderry Ireland. William's trade when he enlisted was a rancher; he was 5'11" tall. No date is found on when he left Ireland or when he came to Canada.

On 13 November 1915 the 47th Battalion sailed from Monteal aboard R.M.S. MISSANABIE of the Canadian Pacific Line (built in 1914 at Glasgow, Scotland and later sunk by UB87 on 9 September 1918 52 miles off the south coast of Ireland). William arrived at Plymouth England on 29 November 1915. After a long period of training the 47th Battalion left England for the Western Front and arrived in France the next day on 11 August 1916. William was wounded on 10 Nov 1916 with a gunshot wound to his back and thigh. He was evacuated to England at the London Temperance Hospital and then, in January 1917, he went to the Canadian Convalescence Hospital in Kent.

By 12 May 1917 he is back with the 47th Battalion. While his Commonwealth War Graves certificate has a death date of 26 October 1917, his records show 26-28 October 1917 and in France or Belgium. I have not researched the WWI war diaries of the 47th Battalion to find where the Battalion was at this time. Private William Davin is remembered on panel 10-26-28 of the Menin Gate in Ypres, Belgium.

Finding a WWI Westie memorialized in an Irish church added some historical and regimental appreciation to our trip. And this made me reflect on another Canadian soldier with a personal

connection who also served in the 47th Battalion in WWI.

428105 Private Frank Riddell Steven (1880-1941) joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force (C.E.F.) on 12 March 1915. Earlier I mentioned a fourth grandparent being a Scot; Frank Steven was his 10th and last child who was the youngest brother of my grandfather, William George Steven (1871-1939). In doing our genealogy I knew where the other four sons and five daughters were; no one in the family knew what happened to young Frank. Two of the sons moved to South Africa in the late 1800s and in a family letter written by a South African cousin it referred to "Uncle Frank joined the Canadian Army in WWI"! I retrieved Frank's file from Library and Archives Canada and saw his was a Westie.

When he enrolled in New Westminster, he was put into the 72nd Battalion (Seaforth Highlanders); on the same day of 12 March 1915, he was transferred to the 47th Battalion; his service number is of the block of numbers for Westies. And he went overseas to England and France with the 47th Battalion. Soon after arriving in France, he was transferred to the 7th Battalion with whom he served with for the rest of WWI.

I was curious as to why there was no discharge certificate in Frank's file. He was released from the C.E.F. in England, where he was born. He did come back to Canada in the 1920s and died in Vancouver in 1941. I found his grave in Mountain View Cemetery, Vancouver.

And I didn't know I had another Westie in the family during the years I was a Westie.



1922 RCACC (Aldergrove) held their Annual Ceremonial Review (ACR) on June 11 at CFS Aldergrove. This was also a celebration of the Corps' 80th anniversary. As a Westie cadet corps, they were honoured to have LCol Gregory Chan as their reviewing officer. Also in attendance were Col Bill White (ret'd), Capt Kody Thompson (CO of 192 CEF), Lt(N) Kevin Deck, CWO Marko Vanninen (Finnish Army), Capt Trevor Henderson (former CO of 1922), Dana Garcia-Annand (Army Cadet League) and Byron Bassaraba (Legion Rep).

Despite a loss of much senior leadership during COVID and a late influx of new cadets, the cadets performed very well on parade, giving a traditional Westie 110%. WO Jaelyn Ross was awarded the Legion Medal of Excellence for excellence in citizenship outside of the Cadet program and Sgt Aryan Bhardwaj was awarded the Lord Strathcona Medal for exemplary performance in physical and military training.

#1789 RCACC Hope Annual Ceremonial Review

The Westie Cadet Corp in Hope held their ACR on June 3rd. Special guests included were Col White, Col MacKinnon, Lt (N) Kevin Deck from the RCSU, Ian Williams, President of Hope Legion and Linda Pickell and Doug Noble from the Association.

This cadet corp has growing steadily over the year. Their drill and parade were amazing when you think the cadets are mostly first year.

Following the parade, the cadets had displays that the guests and families could look at and refreshments were served.

All the officers, CI staff, and private individuals should be very proud of their cadets.
