Visit to the New Westminster Archives


I made a visit to the New Westminster Archives on 17 October 2023. Upon asking to see the file that they have on the 104th, I was both shocked and surprised by what was in the file. I discovered three sets of nominal rolls that had been typed up in the Orderly Room of the 104th Regiment. The nominal rolls were grouped by place of residence. They are titled as follows;

- First Contingent Nominal Roll of Men of the 104th Regt Quota to the 1st B.C. Batt C.E.F.- Now on Active Service Orderly Room, New Westminster BC April 27th 1915 (See photo below showing part of the 1st page)
- Second Contingent Nominal Roll of Men of the 104th Regt Quota to the 29th Battalion C.E.F. - Now Stationed in Hastings Park, Vancouver - Orderly Room, New Westminster BC - April 28th 1915
- Third Contingent Nominal Roll of Men of the 104th Regt Quota to the 47th Battalion C.E.F. Orderly Room, New Westminster BC April 20th 1915

The 1st BC Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force became the 7th Battalion C.E.F. that was formed up in Val Cartier, Quebec.

Last Post Fund Research – A Very Rewarding Passion by Wendy Trepke

I am a volunteer researcher for the Last Post Fund. The objective of the Last Post Fund – Unmarked Grave Initiative is to provide a permanent military marker for eligible Veterans who lie in unmarked graves. I would like to tell you how my passion for honoring those who served started, and the process I go through to honour them through this program.

I started on this journey in November 2020 when volunteering to be a photographer of headstones for Find a Grave. FindaGrave.com is a free website where memorials can be created, or existing ones found for deceased loved ones. An individual in Belfast, Ireland contacted me and asked if I would take a photo of his great uncle's headstone. Reporting back that his relative was resting in an unmarked grave, he revealed that his great uncle was a WW1 Canadian soldier and a recipient of the Military Medal. How sad that this brave soldier rested unrecognized for 43 years! I applied to the Last Post Fund for a military headstone, and it was so rewarding to see my first headstone placed, that I decided I would research in earnest to find more unmarked veterans' graves. A book titled "Canucks in Khaki" by Warren Sommer, providing WW1 historical military context and personal information about men who enlisted from Langley and the Lower Mainland was my inspiration. Many of these men enlisted with the 131st Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF) based in New Westminster, British Columbia. The unit began recruiting in late 1915. The Nominal Roll for the 131st Battalion is a list of the Officers, NCOs and Men (no women) compiled prior to embarking for England on October 31, 1916. It provides the soldier's Regimental Number, Rank, Name, Former Corps, Name of Next of Kin, Address of Next of Kin, Country of Birth, as well as the place and date they were "Taken On Strength".

Portion of the 131st Battalion Nominal Roll (Library and Archives Canada)

To reach the point where one can determine if a veteran rests in an unmarked grave, it is best to use an example: Regimental Number 790605 – McTaggart, William Henry

The Service Record on Library and Archives Canada provides <u>Birth Date</u>: 1893-09-18; <u>Birth Location</u>; Mission City, BC, <u>Next of Kin</u>; George Alexander McTaggart, father residing Matsqui, BC; <u>Discharge</u>: Demobilization; <u>Battalion</u>: 7th Canadian Infantry in France. Death notification may be included and provides death date and location: February 12, 1970. Awards or medals are detailed. Additional Library and Archives sources are Veterans Death Cards: First World War and Military Medals, Honours and Awards, 1812-1969. The service card provides the address as of 1921 which can be helpful to know where the veteran went after the war.

BC Archives provides death registrations on-line up to 2002. The death registration is located, and place of burial is found. If the veteran left the province and died elsewhere, Ancestry.ca is used to research the death location. A search for an obituary on Newspapers.com can often provide the

burial location. It can also state surviving family members which can assist in locating burial location. A veteran cremated and not interred does not qualify for the program.

Find a Grave is used initially to determine if a memorial has been created and if a headstone has been photographed. If not, the memorial is created, the plot location is requested from the cemetery, a photo request is submitted, or a trip to the cemetery is required to locate the gravesite. If no headstone exists an application is submitted to the Last Post Fund.



There were 1052 soldiers on the 131st Battalion Nominal Roll. Of the veterans researched, 45 were found to be resting in an unmarked grave. Applications have been submitted for these brave men. Research beyond the 131st Battalion has uncovered an additional 358 veterans resting in an unmarked grave.

During my research, there were some stories that touched me deeply and have stayed with me:

Alphonse Joseph Angelo, 790101. Born in Fernie, BC, the son of an indigenous mother and Italian father. He enlisted from the Providence Orphanage in New Westminster at 17 years of age, leaving his younger brother Joseph behind. Alphonse died of wounds sustained in battle in 1918 and rests in the Queant Communal Cemetery British Extension Cemetery in France. His younger brother was adopted into an indigenous family.

Private Tadashi "Tow" Inouye, 688274. Born in Japan, he served with the 47th Canadian Infantry Battalion in France and was awarded the Military Medal for bravery at Cambrai. He died in 1926 and his surviving family members were interned in the Japanese internment camp. His final resting place is unknown, but he is memorialized on the Japanese Canadian War Memorial in Stanley Park.



"Lest We Forget"

The Royal Westminster Regiment Association Trip to Northwest Europe 2025 Commemorating the actions of the 47th Battalion and The Westminster Regiment

The Board of the Association have been engaged in planning a trip, to include all members of the Regimental family, Band, serving Battalion, Cadet Corps and retired members and family, to Northwest Europe. The intent of this trip to cover and commemorate the activities of the 47th Battalion C.E.F. during the First World War and the Westminster Regiment in 1945 in the Second World War. The second part of the trip coincides with the 80th Anniversary of the Liberation of the Netherlands by the British and Canadian Armies.

Similar to our trip to Italy in 2019 the Association will be sponsoring senior cadets from our five Cadet Corps to give them an opportunity to attend.



Menin Gate – Ypres Belgium

1st Phase 25 April to 30 April 2025

This first phase is dedicated to the engagements of the 47th Battalion during the First World War. The tour will start by flying into Paris and then travel to Arras. During this phase we have visits to locations of our battles, which include;

- Somme 1916
- Arras 1917-1918
- Vimy 1917
- Hill 70
- Ypres 1917
- Passchendaele

- Amiens
- Drocourt-Queant
- Canal du Nord
- Valenciennes

We will take part in the Parade at the Menin Gate – Last Post Ceremony on 28 April 2025.

We will pay our respects to our fallen members at a number of locations in France and Belgium. Due to the vast number of our war dead and the numerous locations will not get to all of them. If there are family members who have a relative buried in France and Belgium, we will make arrangements for them to visit the cemetery or commemorative panel.




The Vimy Memorial – Vimy Ridge, France

2nd Phase 01 to 07 May 2025

The second phase involves travel to the Netherlands with a visit to Bruges on route. This phase is dedicated to the engagements of the Westminster Regiment and the part played in the Liberation of Holland. This includes visits to ground where our battles took place;

- Operation "Destroyer" and the "Island"
- Operation "Cleanser" (battle honour **Ijsselmeer**)
- Delfzijl Pocket and Operation "Canada" (battle honour **Delfzijl Pocket**)

On 04 May 2025 we will also participate in the commemorations, to honour our fallen members, at the two Canadian War Cemeteries at Holten in the morning and Groesbeek in the evening.

Our Cadets

TAKE A DIVE INTO THE 2316 WESTIE CORPS

2316 RCACC the Royal Westminster Regiment is a yearly program for children between the ages of 12 to 18 that teaches them about the fundamentals of survival, keeping up with physical and emotional health and promoting interest in sea, land and air armed forces. Through the program, there are weekly training nights where you'll be taught by one of our officers or more often, a senior cadet, someone who has put in the commitment, and time and can teach you a topic they learned when they had just started.

Outside of weekly training nights, there are days where cadets can learn specific skills and be available for more opportunities outside weekly training nights. These skills can be, marksmanship, learning how to properly and safely use a daisy air rifle and getting to practice shooting. Reconnaissance, where we learn in-depth survival skills that can be used during field training exercises. Physical fitness, this year we have the opportunity to learn and prepare for Prepara or in other words learning how to parachute, this takes intensive and committed work of cadets to condition themselves in fitness. All of these extra training nights can teach skills and discipline cadets can use outside of the program.

During the year we have the opportunity to participate in overnight or all-day activities. Usually led by the senior cadets they introduce a lot of those skills taught during weekly training nights to the test. Field Training Exercises (FTXs) are overnight activities where the core head up into the wilderness and spend a weekend together, learning about our environment, and how to use it to our advantage and even play fun games hosted by the senior cadets. These weekends put skills like navigation, survival, teamwork and leadership to work. All-day activities are activities that are usually held in our area, close by the armoury, planned by an officer and led by senior cadets. These activities can range from a city scavenger hunt or participating in community service. These activities all encourage teamwork and commitment among everyone.

The Westie family is like no other. When you stay with us you'll start to grow up with your peers, especially if you join at 12 and stay until you age out at 19, you'll find yourself connecting with them and making unforgettable connections. We treat each other like family, we care and look out for everyone in our family, no matter who you are, we're all one big family. The New West Army cadet program is a place where you'll learn skills you won't learn at your average everyday school class lecture and make friends that you'll learn to grow with and you'll start to build yourself up to be someone you strive to be.

As of this year we've been working very hard to re-build skills we've lost during the pandemic and we're starting to polish them. We've also had an incredible amount of new recruits in our ranks, that we hope will carry on our core as we grow. Since September we have been practicing our marksmanship and slowly trying to build a marksmanship team to send out to competitions. This year we've also had Pre-para, something that's been brought back after a long time and we've been working on preparing everyone to see if they're up for a new skill. The senior cadets are also working on getting old traditions back, like mess dinner, slowly organizing how it'll look. We are looking forward to having a lot more bonding activities in the core and hope for another outstanding year.

After the lessons, the cadets put into practice what they had learnt. In the afternoon we went snowshoeing. It was a challenging trek of 5.5km with a considerable amount of it being a steep uphill. For some, this was their first-time snowshoeing. Everyone managed to push through and get the job done. Prior to dinner cadets continued on their snow trenches. Most cadets felt comfortable sleeping in their handmade shelters overnight. Games were played prior to everyone going to bed for the night after an exhausting day. With a light snow coming down most of Sunday was spent on camp clean-up. Taking down the shelters, the tents and the mod-tent etc. ready for the bus ride home. When picking up their cadets, most parents commented how tired yet happy they looked. A very successful training weekend was had by all!

Next month will bring more star level training with an emphasis on leadership and drill.


2nd Lieutenant Johannes Mulder – Medal of Good Citizenship
