#### Bringing History Home: Recovering the Lost Regimental Medal of S/Sgt D.A. Purver


In January 2025, while I was vacationing at my home in southern Utah, fellow Association member Ian Jackson sent me a link to eBay. Ian and I were army cadets in the late '60s and '70s, crossing paths during cadet and Regimental exercises. He was with the Abbotsford cadets. The link that Ian sent me was for a Canadian Forces Decoration being sold for \$60 with the name S/Sgt D.A. Purver of the Westminster Regiment.

As I did not recognize Purver's name from my lifelong association to the Regiment, I decided dig deeper and find his story. Though my initial thought was to simply find his story

and why the CD was on eBay, I soon felt there was a need to return the medal back to the family or, at the very least, to the Regimental Museum. So, I made a bid on the CD. At the time of my bid, there were 5 days left, and I noticed 2 other people listed as 'watching' the bids. I contacted the seller to find out more information, discovering he had purchased the CD in a batch of medals and had no knowledge of how the medal came to be sold originally. I advised the seller of my intentions to buy the medal and return it to the family or donate it to the Regimental Museum. I was hoping the seller would see the importance of this gesture and sell me the medal directly, but he didn't. A few days later, the seller sent me a message asking if I was in fact the sole bidder, at which time he offered it to me directly - the cost being \$80 for the medal and postal tracking. I agreed, paid, and the seller removed the listing, promising to ship the medal immediately.

While all this was going on, I was trying to find out more about Sandy Purver and to locate any family. One of the items the seller had obtained as part of his research was a partial service record of Purver, which he sent to me. The documents were mostly about the awarding of the CD as well as an investigation into a traffic accident Purver was involved in as a passenger in the Mission area while riding in a Jeep.



Donald Alexander 'Sandy' Purver was born 4 July 1924 in Vancouver but was raised on the family farm in Clayburn in the Matsqui area. Sandy would marry Joan, and they would have 4 daughters. Sandy joined The

Westminster Regiment 18 August 1942 and was with 'C' Coy in Abbotsford. It is not sure at this time that Sandy served overseas in WWII but indications that he didn't. Sandy would work his way up through the ranks and become an Acting Staff Sergeant and one document I found indicated his rank as Warrant Officer. I believe this was after his release and

because of the S/Sgt. rank being done away with and replaced with the WO rank. Sandy Purver served the Regiment until his release on 3 January 1956. He would receive his CD after he was released from the Army. In his later years, Sandy and his family lived in Barriere BC.



My research into locating family members had begun and though I have years of investigative experience and I've been a genealogist for many years, I was not having much success locating any of Sandy's 4 daughters until I decided to search on Facebook for any sites that were associated to Barriere, and I found two that could work. One was a marketplace site, and the other was a 'things happening' site in

the Barriere area. I posted a message on both sites and in a couple of hours I had a few messages from people offering names of the daughters etc. A few hours later, one of Sandy's daughters, Rose Purver, sent me a message asking what it was I was looking for. I explained to Rose what I was doing, and she seemed very surprised I would go to all this trouble. I advised her that once I receive the medal that I would send it to her. She told me that she was unaware of any medals her

father received but she did tell me that he had his "hat pin" (hat badge) that he attached to a belt buckle and wore it every day until his passing.

S/Sgt. D.A. 'Sandy' Purver CD passed away 3 December 2005 in Kamloops BC and is buried in a marked grave at the Hazelwood Cemetery in Abbotsford. He was a lifelong member of the Masonic Lodge and Shriners.





# A Family's Sacrifice: Oscar, Arthur & James Crandell of 104th Bn, Westminster Fusiliers

In February 2025, I was in the Vancouver area serving as a volunteer for the Invictus Games and visited the Fraser Cemetery, where many of my family are buried. As I was walking around, I saw a Veteran headstone, not in the Veteran section, with the name Private Oscar Arthur Crandell on it, who died at age 18, on 8 June 1916. Because of all the research I had done so far with the Last Post Fund in finding Veterans buried in unmarked graves, I was curious how a soldier had a Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) headstone and he was only 18.

Many Veterans who served the CEF and died at home did receive a CWGC headstone but their ages would be older. The search began and here is what I found:

Oscar Arthur Crandell was born on 8
September 1866 in Wisconsin USA and later
came to New Westminster where he would
marry Jessie Baird in a ceremony in
Cloverdale, 16 October 1893. Oscar would
become a schoolteacher and in August of 1914,
he attended an Instructors Course in Esquimalt
and gained a certificate as a Lieutenant, Cadet
Instructor. In New Westminster as well as the
greater Vancouver area, cadet corps were very
common as part of a Cadet Battalion




Oscar Arthur Crandell's certificate as a Lieutenant, Cadet Instructor in 1914 Esquimalt.

throughout the area. At the outbreak of WWI, Oscar would join the 104<sup>th</sup> Westminster Fusiliers as a Private and was issued service #1336. He would not be accepted to join the Canadian Expeditionary Force due to his age.

Oscar and Jessie had two sons who both joined the 104<sup>th</sup> and then the 131<sup>st</sup> CEF 29 April 1916 in New Westminster. Private Arthur Leslie Crandell (Service #790994) was born 15 August 1894 in Surrey BC. He joined the


104<sup>th</sup> and would serve with the 47<sup>th</sup> Bn CEF overseas where he was awarded the Military Medal for bravery while at Vimy Ridge as a stretcher barrier. Arthur would serve out his career during the war and returned to Canada and was discharged 4 July 1919. Arthur died in Vancouver 13 January 1967.

The other son, Private James Gordon Crandell (Service #790995) was born 28 April 1898 in New Westminster. He too joined the 104<sup>th</sup> on 29 April 1916 and would serve overseas in France with the 47<sup>th</sup> Bn CEF. Unfortunately, James would be Killed in Action 4 February 1917 and is buried in the Villers Station Cemetery, Villiers au Bois, near Vimy. He was 18 years old. Oscar died in June 1916, just after both sons joined the 104<sup>th</sup> – the upsetting truth is that he would not know that his son James would be killed in France during battle.





Document indicating that James Crandell was killed in action on 4 February 1917.

My research indicates the CWGC has made

an error on the father's, Oscar Arthur Crandell, headstone in Fraser Cemetery by indicating he died at age 18 on 8 June 1916 when in fact he was 50 years of age at the time of his death. I've sent an application to the CWGC to have the New Westminster headstone corrected to reflect the correct age of Oscar at the time of his death. Like my own family serving the Regiment, this is another example how members of the same family signed up at the time of war to serve their country

where many paid the ultimate sacrifice.

#### The 2316 Groundsheet Report ....... WO Mikaela Payumo

2316 "The Royal Westminster Regiment" Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps (RCACC) is part of the Canadian Cadet Organization where youth from 12 to 18 years of age across Canada develop their skills in citizenship, leadership, and physical fitness. Our Corps trains weekly on Thursday evenings. Cadets are instructed by CIC officers and our senior cadets who have committed their time and effort on topics and skills to develop their younger peers.

Outside of the Thursday night training, there are extracurricular teams where the cadets can hone specific skills such as marksmanship, drill, reconnaissance, first aid, physical fitness, and training for pre-parachutist selection. Throughout the year, cadets can drop in on marksmanship training nights to learn to safely and properly handle the Daisy air rifle and practice their firing techniques while having one-on-one coaching. Cadets who would like to improve their drill and learn more difficult drill commands than what is being taught on the regular training nights are instructed by



instructors who have a strong background and passion for drill. Reconnaissance (recce) is a set of more in-depth survival skills that can be used during field training weekends and expeditions. First aid team teaches cadets how to care for someone in a first aid emergency such as circulation emergencies, sprains and fractures,



diabetic and allergic reactions. Our physical fitness team looks at organized sports and games, and how to stay active and fit. Pre-parachutist selection, also known as prepara, is a special opportunity only Army Cadets have, to prepare and condition their fitness and mental discipline. All these extra activities outside of the regular training nights give cadets skills and knowledge to help push themselves with their cadet careers and outside of the program.

Led by senior cadets, field training exercises FTXs give the cadets the chance to show off what they've learned on their weekly training nights. The Corps spend the weekend together in the wilderness learning about the environment they're in and how to make use of it, and at

the end of the day, fun games are played seniors to bring the field training exercise weekend to a close after three days of hard work. Our cadets in the Silver and Gold Star training levels have a chance to go on expeditions where they focus on trekking over long distances, canoeing, taking care of their equipment, and taking advantage of the environment.

Our part of the Westie Family has had its ups and downs over the past few years, but we went through it all together. From the moment you join, you grow with your peers. You will make unforgettable memories and connections with the people you meet, in and out of the Corps. We look out for each other and celebrate our accomplishments. Our family continues to grow bigger as each year passes by, even if you leave or age out of the program, you'll always be a part of our family. 2316 RCACC is a place where you learn skills you'll use as you navigate through life as the friends, experiences, lessons and skills you acquired will last a lifetime.

As we are halfway through the training year, as we still are re-building skills we've lost from the pandemic, we have accomplished so much in the last year. From gaining more recruits each year, participation in our teams has grown, such as our marksmanship, drill and first aid teams. Participating in ceremonies and parades in our communities, staffing area-directed activities around the lower mainland. Sending our cadets to staff and taking multiple different courses during the summer in and out of the provinces, to three cadets from our core being chosen to take part in the upcoming Euro trip with The Royal Westminster Regiment Association. As our seniors and staff continue to show their outstanding leadership,

we've slowly been making progress to bring back core traditions we've stopped due to the pandemic. Planning for a mess dinner is underway and is scheduled for Spring. We look forward to more activities and accomplishments from our fellow Westies as they continue to strive and another outstanding year.
