## THE YOUNG SOLDIERS' TRAINING PLAN

The Young Soldiers' Training Plan was accepted in The Westminster Regiment in the fall of 1959. Since that time over one hundred young soldiers have passed through the ranks, some to remain with the unit, others to join the permanent force.

The object of the plan is to train boys between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years of age (these boys being over the age for cadets and still too young to become soldiers in the unit). These young soldiers, with their parents' consent, become active members of the unit with all the privileges of the unit, except the use of the wet canteen They do their training on Friday evenings and Saturday mornings, and participate in all shoots and exercises carried out by the regiment.

Their training consists of regular infantry training, specialist training, as well as a large dose of National Survival training. At the conclusion of the training year, selected boys attend a thirty day camp at H.Q., B.C. Area, where they live in barracks and undergo intensive training under Permanent Force Officers and N.C.O.'s.

It is regrettable that under present conditions only a limited number of young soldiers can attend this camp. We hope that in the future there will be facilities for ALL young soldiers to attend camp to enable them to benefit from this training and to inspire them to continue as useful members of the regiment.
